A word from our Minister....

St. Columba was from an Irish royal family, but chose the life of a monk. He quarrelled with King Diarmait, chief of the kings of Ireland. Following a civil war Columba left Ireland and became a missionary. Columba and his friends sailed first to Oronsay and then to Iona from which no glimpse of Ireland could be seen. On his arrival he established a missionary base on Iona and his monks travelled over the sea in their frail coracles preaching the Gospel in Orkney and Shetland islands, in the Faroes and the Hebrides. The early days of this community were filled with prayer, study and manual labour. One commentator wrote that "The secret of the early Celts lay in this, that they linked sacrament with service, altar with hearth, worship with work."

For us too it is important to discover the rhythm of praying as we work and through our work. Sometimes a simple manual task can even assist the praying heart in its focus. Prayer baskets were woven simply out of the reeds as monastics framed their prayers. The simplest task can be for us a prayer-basket.

As Lent draws to a close and Easter beckons, the challenge for us is to find ways in which we can "link sacrament with service, table with hearth, worship with work" and form a modern day prayer-basket.

Breaking News....

Presbytery Planning

A few years ago, the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, agreed that by 2014, the Church would reduce the number of its Ministers and Presbytery and Parish Workers (PPW's) to 1000(from about 1200). The Ministries Council was charged with doing this under the heading of "20:20 Vision." In the Presbytery of Glasgow this meant a reduction from 163 to 136.7 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) posts. Over the past 16 months a Committee of Presbytery, the Strategy Advisory Group (STAG) has been preparing a Draft Plan to present a new Presbytery Plan. At the Kirk Session meeting on 21st. February we considered our 'score' and the first Draft of the Plan. Under this Plan, Springfield Cambridge was allocated 0.8(a part-Time Ministry) of a FTE. Many other congregations across the city and Presbytery were also allocated reduced resources. However at the meeting of the Presbytery of Glasgow on 13th. March, 2012, the first Draft of the Plan was rejected by Presbytery and the Convener of STAG resigned as did his Committee.

What does this mean for us and the Presbytery? In the short term, this will have no immediate impact. However, with the rejection of the Draft Plan, the old 'suspended' Plan is reinstated, and Presbytery will now need to form a new Committee to prepare and present a new Plan for approval by Presbytery and by the Ministries Council by the end of this year. No mean feat I suspect, so watch this space for more breaking news....

TRIBUTE - Miss Jenny Knox

Miss Janet (Jenny) Rankine Knox was born on 16th. May 1930 and brought up in Montrose Terrace, Auchinairn, having an older sister Margaret, and two younger sisters Mary & Elizabeth. The family lived for a few years in Lenzie before returning to Kenmure Avenue in Bishopbriggs. <u>Family</u> life was an important facet of Jenny's life, being as she was a daughter, sister, sisterin-law, and an aunt to 8 nephews/nieces. She looked forward to visits or holidays to Alex and Margaret and their family in Harrogate, Stonehaven or Comrie.

A second facet of Jenny's life was her <u>fortitude</u>. She left school at the age of 14, and then worked for a while at Tennent's the licensed grocers in Bishopbriggs, then with Coopers in Howard Street in the butchers department. From there she moved to work at the Evening Times, a job which she loved and provided her with a wealth of stories to tell. Her last job was with J. Menzies in the village where her reliability as a key holder meant that she was the one who often opened up early in the morning and this was valued by colleagues and customers alike.

A third facet of Jenny's life was her sense of <u>fun</u>. She had a good sense of humour, a ready smile on her face and a welcoming nature. She loved to sing, and was proud to have been a part of the Glasgow Phoenix Choir, and Jenny was always keen to recount her audition experiences to join this prestigious city choir. With the Phoenix she travelled to Germany and to the USA where those experiences further enlarged her horizons.

A fourth and final facet of Jenny's life was her faith. She was a woman of the 'good book' - who found comfort and strength in the pages of Holy Scripture. She was a woman of prayer - who had a daily and living relationship with her Lord and Saviour. She was a woman who valued the Sacraments of the Church, especially Holy Communion. She looked forward to Home Communion visits and prepared for it with a mood of eager expectation and anticipation - the coffee table was set with a white linen table cloth, and an Iona Cross and an ebony wooden cross brought from the Holy Land were the table's essential furnishings. In worship and service over the years Jenny had grafted herself into the true vine - Jesus Christ. As an Elder, the Springfield Road Manse family had many reasons to be glad she was their Elder. Attentive to detail as our Roll-Keeper she maintained integrity of life and faith in all her personal dealings with folk. In the guiet conviction of her personal faith she selected all the readings and hymns for her own Funeral Service. We give thanks for her life, faith and service and commend her to God's eternal care and keeping.

Resurrection



Last month's cover represented the period of Lent. This month's cover very much represents the period of Easter. It is part of a series of stained glass windows to be found within St John Evangelical Lutheran Church & Child Care Center in Colton, California. The descriptive text that accompanies the picture listed on their web site is an extremely uplifting account of this most

central element of the Christian Faith and is included here as presented.

"If Christ had remained dead and in the grave after His crucifixion, our salvation would remain in doubt – and as St. Paul says, our faith would be futile (1Corinthians 15:17). But Christ has risen from the dead! When the women arrived before sunrise on the third day, the stone was rolled away, the tomb empty, and angels declared: You seek Jesus of Nazareth, Who was crucified. He is risen! He is not here. Behold the place where they laid Him. (St. Mark 16:6)"



[Editor's note: the above is indeed a marvellous piece of précis encapsulating this crucial event. What then followed was, however, a smidgen puzzling:

Treasurer's Report

Enclosed with this month's magazine is a Summary Set of Accounts for 2011 showing an abbreviated General Fund Income and Expenditure statement together with a breakdown of the Individual Funds. A copy of the General Fund Budget for 2012 that the Congregational Board have approved is also enclosed. Copies of the full set of OSCR approved accounts are available on the bookshelf in the Hall of Fellowship.

I am pleased to say that 2011 was a successful year financially for Springfield Cambridge Church with the General Fund showing a surplus for the year of £14,286. Although our Income from Offerings was broadly flat when compared to 2010 it was pleasing to note that Gift Aid Income increased by 1.5% year on year. The number of members giving "Tax Efficiently" also increased from 240 on 1/1/2011 to 249 on 31/12/2011 and there are also another 14 members who regularly give Tax Efficiently to any appeals that take place during the year depending on their individual tax situation. Our Tax Recoveries were impacted by the cessation of the Governments "transitional relief" for Tax Relief which ended on the 5th April 2011.

As well as Income from Offerings we also received contributions during 2011 from various Church Organisations including The Guild, The Boys' Brigade (Anchor Boys and Junior Section) and also the Badminton Club. Last year we also received over £16,000 in donations/contributions from the outside agencies who regularly utilise our excellent facilities. This amount was 68% higher than in 2010. There is minimal cost to the church apart from heating and lighting for the Outside Agencies as most of the "opening/closing" of the church buildings is carried out by volunteer members.

In addition the "Ways and Means Fundraising Group" also undertook numerous successful events in 2011 and this meant substantial contributions were made to both the Building and Fabric Funds.

In late 2011 an appeal was launched to replenish the Fabric Fund which was diminished due to the reserves being required to fund the Building Project which was completed in mid-2011. To date I am delighted to say that the appeal has raised just over £10,000 with £7,000 of that amount being "Gift-Aided", meaning that a Tax Recovery of circa £1750 will be received in due course. Thanks to all those who have contributed so generously!

To partly fund the Building Project we also drew down a loan of £60,000 from the Church of Scotland payable over 5 years with the final repayment due on 31/3/2016. Repayments are made half yearly with the first payment of £6,855 made on 30/9/2011. The Interest rate on the loan is a very competitive 5%.

Although 2011 was successful financially we start 2012 with caution as we have substantial commitments to meet including Mission and Ministry Costs of nearly £67,000 for the year and two Loan repayments totalling £13,700 during the year. All costs are continuing to rise, with our Heating and Lighting for 2012 predicted to be nearly 16% higher than 2011 due to the new price agreement under the Church of Scotland Energy Tariff taking effect on 1/4/2012.

Despite the continuing difficult economic situation and the rising costs that we are facing I am confident that with the support of <u>every member</u> in Springfield Cambridge we are well placed to meet the challenges that lie ahead and 2012 can be another successful year for us.

"You will go to prison" are the words from the judge that the accused dreads to hear. They indicate the end of liberty, possibly for a lengthy time. HMP Low Moss, our local prison, has recently re-opened as a modern building with a regime that is progressive. Its aim is to equip prisoners for a return to society. Opportunities for work and training are provided.

As I stood outside the prison for the first time the bullet-proof glass doors swung open and I entered, identified myself and was checked for contraband items. I socialised with some of the other arrivals, some of whom I knew. Then a member of staff arrived to show us round the building. First, however, the Governor thanked us for attending. We were volunteers from local churches who hope to provide a service for the families of prisoners on visiting days.

For many of us it is a new type of Christian witness, just as visiting loved ones in prison may be a new experience for the friends and families of at least some of the prisoners. Our mission is to all who find themselves there. There are many ways of serving Jesus and, according to the bible, prison visiting is one of them
