A word from our Minister... failure, success and second chances.

Sometimes as a preacher, you have a clear idea of what you hope to achieve with a sermon, of whom you hope you will reach. Sometimes the law of unintended consequences takes over, and someone takes pleasure in what you have said, while another takes offence. You realise quickly, as a preacher where the reactions of others are concerned to expect the unexpected! In a way that is at it should be, for that allows room for the Holy Spirit to move in customary mysterious ways.

Recently, I clearly struck a chord with some folk when I was referring to the highs and lows, the ups and downs of life, and someone kindly sent me this quote: *"If kids never see their parents mess up -- if parents never fail -- how will children learn to deal with failure in their own lives, and how could anyone ever live without messing up?"*

Sometimes I come across people of faith who struggle with the idea that Christians can make mistakes. Their faith has no room for mistakes. They demand that you get it right first time. There is no need for a second chance. If you make a mistake, you live with it and like the rich young man, are doomed to be sad, at least for the rest of your life. That becomes your permanent mark, like the one that Cain wore.

You can see that mark on all kinds of people: politicians, ministers, married people who have had affairs, people who have made serious mistakes with their children and many others who have made serious mistakes. But how can we help them?

We need a theology of brokenness. And in this Easter season surely we can claim that. We need a theology that teaches us that even though we cannot unscramble an egg, God's grace lets us live happily and with renewed innocence far beyond any egg we may have scrambled.

We need a theology that teaches us that God does not just give us one chance, but that every time we close a door He opens another one for us. Brokenness need not frighten us; indeed it may be the means of us being remade by God.

I think it is in the closing scene of the film “The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel” the line **“The only real failure is the failure to try; and the measure of our success is how we cope with disappointment”** is delivered. So let’s keep trying this Easter season to be the people God wants us to be, mistakes and all.

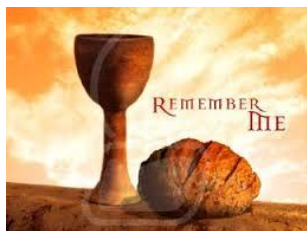
Prayer for All (Open to All/ Praying for All) 6.45

Tribute to Gordon Lyle

“Gordon Lyle was born on the 9th April 1937 and died on the 26th February 2015. He was born in Bright Street, Garngad, and had an older brother Jim, younger sister Cath, and a younger brother Jack. The family moved from Garngad to Milton and lived at 146 Westray Street. Gordon was a bright boy and was sent to Whitehill Senior Secondary School. As was the custom in those days, he left school at 15 and began work at R D Waddell as a costing clerk where he met a young post clerk by the name of Sadie. Soon after this he was made redundant and went to work at Meechans Iron Works in Scotstoun, where he met his lifelong friend John Beresford. Initially Gordon was on the shop floor, resplendent in a boiler suit, however he was shortly removed from the shop floor and found himself in the drawing office. He attended Stow College and was awarded an HNC for his efforts, specialising in marine heating and ventilation. Following this he became self-employed and worked for a number of years with Bob Fulton, before working with Abb Flakt Marine Oil & Gas at 78 Queen Street. A further period of redundancy for two years followed before he began working as a draughtsman with Kvaerner Govan, specialising in CAD work until once again he was made redundant at the age of sixty. This allowed Gordon to enjoy a little more time with Sadie and the family at a time when Gordon’s health was not ideal.

Having met Sadie on that fortuitous first employment opportunity, Gordon and Sadie were married on the 13th February 1960 in Woodlands Church. For eighteen months or so, the young couple lived with Gordon's family in Westray Street, before moving to 226 Castlemilk Road in Kings Park where they lived for 7 years, before moving to their final home at 17 Morar Crescent in 1968. Sadie and Gordon were blessed with 3 children: Linda, Andrew and Karen and grandchildren Jacqui, Scott (both of whom are currently in Australia), Andrew, Holly and Steven.

As a husband Sadie knew Gordon as a quiet, caring, thoughtful and generous man. Generous in the sense that he loved to sit in the garden and watch Sadie do the garden! Gordon had the capacity to see both sides of an argument, even if he knew he was on the right, winning side. He had a sarcastic sense of humour (but it was never a cruel humour, for he had a loving heart.) He could deliver humorous one-liners with great aplomb. Together he and Sadie travelled to the US, Canada, Italy, Austria and enjoyed five fabulous cruises. He loved to read crime thrillers, listen to country and western music and take photographs and develop them at home with the printer his family had given him. He enjoyed playing snooker with Mervyn Porter, his good friend, every second Monday and was a member of Cadder Men's Club. He also enjoyed Scotland's other national drink, and I don't mean Irn-Bru. A wee dram was his favourite tippie especially if it was malt.

In trying to sum up Gordon's life, to arrive at the heart of the matter, and the heart of the man, it would be fair to say that Gordon believed he had led a blessed life (he had known difficulties in his life - he had had a heart attack at 48, suffered from colon cancer and gallstones, and five and a half years ago had a defibrillator fitted just before his Golden Wedding Anniversary celebrations), with no regrets, with a faith that was real, a family in whom he was rightly proud, and with friends who knew him as a faithful, loyal, and reliable individual as Mervyn and John could testify. Of course I can picture him clearly as one of our Elders, ordained here on the 23rd February 1992 serving actively until the 21st May 2013 when ill-health forced him to step down from the Kirk Session. Standing at the door of the Church as part of the duty team, he was always impeccably dressed complete with his trademark moustache and broad warm smile, greeting you with a clear and confident 'Good morning'. His smile was a gift to you which you had no alternative but to return to him and to share with those around you. We give thanks to God for his life and the way in which his life enlarged and enriched ours."

Treasurer's Report

By the time this article goes to press the first quarter of 2015 will be nearly over! Income and Expenditure for the period January–March 2015 is tracking the budgeted figures for the year and we have started to receive settlement of our outstanding Income Tax Claims from HMRC. The next tax recoveries that are due to be credited to us are the General Fund claim for Quarter 3 (2014) and the General Fund claim for Quarter 4 (2014) totalling £8,569.

The main items of expenditure in March were our Central payment to the Church of Scotland of £7,963, partial payment of £1,456 in respect of our Glasgow Presbytery dues for 2015 and a loan repayment of £6,000 (plus interest of £856) to the Church of Scotland General Trustees in respect of the Building work loan taken out in 2011.

Lenten Reflections – “Count your Blessings”

Jared Diamond describes how the first western people to interact with the Papua New Guineans saw what they thought was very inefficient agriculture taking place. The locals planted their crops in tiny, irregular plots amongst trees in poorly irrigated soils. So, the newcomers made the plots larger and more regular, cleared some of the trees and introduced an irrigation system. On the first occasion that the monsoon rains came, entire areas were washed away. Diamond points out that in one year these westerner, technical farmers had destroyed one of the oldest agricultural systems in the world. It was an example of the imposition of technical "know how", without really listening.

Closer to home, let me tell you about Lisa. She was a remarkable young woman whom I got to know who had been homeless off and on since she was 14 and suffered from a range of disabilities that she was quite happy to list. Dyspraxia, dyslexia were two of them, but she had quite a few others besides that she would regularly reel off.

She very much reminded me of the man Jesus met in the land of the Gerasenes (Luke 8: 26 – 39). When Jesus asks this man his name, he replies with the description of his ailment. It wouldn't be the first time that people in poverty or distress have been defined by their problem rather than their personhood.

So often we offer solutions rather than solidarity and we see problems rather than people.

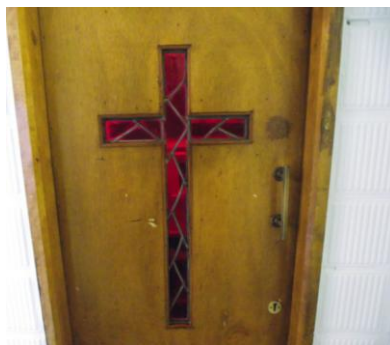
On last month’s Front Cover So what was the intended purpose of the room with the door with the red leaded cross? Here I would extend my sincere thanks to Bill Findlay and Sheila Gibson for collectively applying their thought processes to the question. And the answer? It was intended as an area of quiet and prayerful reflection. It was furnished simply with two chairs and a small table holding a bible. An area of contemplative retreat, one might say.



In this our 150th Anniversary Year, it is interesting to reflect on changes and developments but to also witness that purpose remains constant. For the wee grey church on Springfield Road has become a much used and valued church hall and the rooms that served the former church are now used for practical administrative purposes. We now worship in our extended sanctuary off The Leys. Adjacent to the sanctuary is the Springfield Chapel – an area that can be used by anyone for quiet and reflective thinking and prayer. This is an area that has been enhanced in the last phase with the addition of new, more comfortable chairs. No red cross on the door here – but rather a splendid metal fretwork of the Crown of Thorns; this too was refurbished recently, making the doors easier to open and gain access. Further changes in recent years have seen the main church doors being opened each week day morning so that anyone can enter God's House and use the Chapel for a time of quiet and reflective thinking. The chapel also now contains the church's In Memorium Book – which is freely available for all to add entry to if they wish. The chapel is also used mid-week for a Service, for Bible Study and for Prayer for All (Open to all / praying for all). With regard to prayer. recent times have also seen the addition of a permanent Prayer Box, on its own shelf, in the Hall of Fellowship. Linked to which is the addition of the Prayer Request cards positioned at the end of each pew.

It is quietly pleasing to note in all this that the church has endeavoured to move forward – to retain the positives from the past and to reach forward to the future.
