#### **Treasurer's Report**

This being the final magazine of the year, I would like to take the opportunity to wish you all a very Merry Christmas. Thanks to all the "regular" givers in the congregation for your offerings in 2014. Your support is very much appreciated and this means that we can meet our planned expenditure throughout the year.

We still await settlement from HMRC of our Q2 2014 and Q3 2014 General Fund (Including Gift Aid Small Claims) tax claims totalling around  $\pounds 9,300$ . Another  $\pounds 2,789$  is due from HMRC in respect of tax recoveries on our Fabric Appeal held in late 2013/early 2014 and this should be received by the end of the year.

We are shortly about to undertake further maintenance work to upgrade the heating systems in the church buildings and also hopefully to install a system that will make the buildings more energy efficient and reduce our heating expenditure in the medium/long term. The first tranche of work will cost approximately £12,000 and will be funded mostly by contributions to last year's Fabric Appeal. Thanks to all those who have made it possible to by giving to the appeal!

One Major item of expenditure recently is for emergency repair work to 3 drains in the church car park at a cost of  $\pounds$ 1,190 and we are due to make our final payment of  $\pounds$ 7,554 for our Ministries and Mission Allocation of 2014 in the next few days.

The deficit on the General Fund for the year-to 14/11/2014 is £5,798 and I am pleased to say that we remain on course to meet our budgeted figures for the full year.

I mentioned last month that we have established a "150 Fund" and I am pleased to say that the balance of the fund is already £1,454.

#### The Guild

On 3rd November our speaker was Elaine Webster from the Scottish Language Dictionaries, the nation's resource for the Scots language which is the indigenous language of lowland Scotland. After a few technical problems the members thoroughly enjoyed her presentation and had a wide ranging discussion on the words in frequent use that are by no means 'English'. We were interested in finding out where some of these words originated from and many can be traced back to other European languages. I for one was gratified to hear that many of the words I used while growing up in the East End were not as I thought Glaswegian slang but bona fide 'Scots' words. On 17th November we hosted fellow Guild members from Cadder and Kenmure Guilds when we were entertained by the Columbian Singers accompanied by Margaret Waddell and conducted by Mariot Dallas.
