

# Another word from our Minister... On yer bike

On 7th January, 2016, following the terrible flooding throughout large parts of England and the North East of Scotland, I was cycling from our Manse to Bishopbriggs train station to attend some meetings in 121 George Street, Edinburgh. The rain was 'stoating' off the pavements in the morning darkness, but my waterproofs gave me some protection from the elements. As I crossed the path between Greenhill and Woodfield Avenue my cycle torch picked up ahead of me what looked like a dark puddle. The further I travelled into the puddle, the higher the water rose until it reached the central hub of my wheel, and at which point the cold water washed over my shoes as I frantically pedalled through the depths of what seemed like a deep pond! Despite my waterproofs my feet were soaking. Sitting on the train stripped of my outer layer of waterproofs I quickly began to enjoy the heat of the train, and began to reflect on how miserable I was feeling with wet feet!

But then I thought of those who had been displaced from their homes and lost prized possessions because of the recent severe flooding. My socks would dry, all would be well, and my discomfort was only temporary. Then my mobile phone rang, and it was a friend who is an ex soldier, who could not contain his laughter when I explained my plight - should I go to the toilet on the train, take off my socks, ring them out, and put them on the radiator in the train to dry them out en route to Edinburgh. Such practical ethical dilemmas. He left me with these words ringing in my ears, "Remember Ian, the old army saying, 'Wear a pair, wash a pair, and keep a spare." I had thought with my waterproofs that I was prepared, but clearly I was not.

As I neared Haymarket station, it occurred to me that the way in which the water of the puddle washed over me, is not unlike the grace of God. Sometimes we expect it, and are prepared for it, but sometimes we are not. It floods over us whether we are ready or not, but it leaves its impression and mark upon us. As we approach the time when the clocks will go forward and we near British Summer Time, I hope that this time will be grace filled, but maybe without quite so much rain.

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

Stated Annual Meeting (SAM) 2016 Tuesday 29<sup>th</sup>March 2016, 7.00 pm. Cambridge Chapel. Changes which were
introduced some years ago by the Office of the

Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) mean that at this meeting in the Cambridge Chapel the 2015 Annual accounts will be received by the congregation. The Trustees will previously have met to approve them on Sunday  $21^{s\dagger}$ . February, 2016 as required by OSCR.



This year, the Congregational Board would be pleased to welcome new or returning members of the Board to serve for a three year term. This is an important meeting in the life of our Congregation and you are encouraged to consider serving the

church in this way. Volunteers are needed each year.

Following the SAM, there will be a meeting of the Congregational Board at approximately 7.30 pm in the Cambridge Chapel.

# **Treasurers Report**

Enclosed with this magazine is a statement of summary accounts is shown for 2015 which showing a surplus on the General Fund of £8,388 for the year (excluding legacy income). A full statement of accounts will be submitted to the Stated Annual Meeting on 22nd March and I would urge as many members to attend this short but important meeting. The main financial aspects are as follows: -

- Surplus on the General Fund of £8,388 for 2015 (excluding legacy income)
- We took full advantage of the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme (GADS) and claimed the maximum allowable of £1,250 in respect of Open Plate General Fund Offerings.
- Number of Gift Aid Donors as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2015 is 240 (236 as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2014) with an additional 10 members who also give tax efficiently at certain periods during the year depending on their circumstances.
- Gift Aid General Fund Offerings increased year on year by less then 0.1%
- Ordinary General Expenditure up by 2.8% compared with 2014.
- Building Loan that was taken out with the Church of Scotland General Trustees was repaid early in full on 5<sup>th</sup> May 2015 resulting in a saving of Loan Interest of £797.
- 150 Appeal raised the sum of £13,320 in 2015 with one third of the amount being kept by the church and the remainder being split equally between Marys' Meals and Fresh Start-Women's Aid in East Dunbartonshire.

# BIQ QUESTIONS SMALL ANSWERS???

Prayer for All - what does it mean to me? Prayer is an essential part of our lives as Christians, but is often an area we struggle with. How to pray, when to pray, what to pray?

In a world which is becoming increasingly frantic with activity it is good to be able to sit with the one who says to us, "I am with you..." (St. Matthew 28:20). Few of us live lives so rushed that it is impossible for us to find a few minutes, or even half an hour, when we can let everything around us be quiet and submit ourselves completely to eternity, when we can let it speak to us and ask it about ourselves. In that way we can look very deeply within ourselves and quite far beyond ourselves. Prayer for All gives me the time and space to do that in the company of others, who like me are wrestling with big questions and searching for small answers.

Our cheque was presented to Claire Benjamin of CHAS at our Presentation Dinner at Bishopbriggs Golf Club on Wednesday 03 February.


The grand total raised from our Christmas Concerts for CHAS now stands at a magnificent £247,214.



so where in Europe is this Refugee Centre?

The answer is - 4 miles from our church – 14 minutes down the road in East Campbell Street; this being the Lodging House Mission. On a Sunday evening back in January, Lynne and I attended the Homeless Sunday evening service at the Mission. And an excellent, meaningful and thought provoking and uplifting service it was; led by the Chaplain, Gus McKay; with excellent hymns, poems, songs, an address by Rev Tom Pollok the current Presbytery Moderator and scriptural readings delivered by two of the service users. As I sat in my seat, my eyes were drawn to the side to the impact image of the sleeping bags draped over the old pews to air. Gus McKay kindly gave me permission to photograph the scene and he himself encouraged me to take a photograph of the Night Shelter laid out on the ground floor.

It struck home forcibly to myself that the Christian Community does indeed need and require in all Christian love to reach out and help those in the Refugee Centres in Calais and beyond. But to note and accept that there are needs of others to be met on our own doorstep.

Our 'front cover reflections' on Scottish hymn writers had, of course, to include the Rev John Bell. Born in Kilmarnock in 1949, Rev Bell is closely associated with the Iona Community and the Wild Goose Resource Group. Rev Bell has produced (often in collaboration with his writing partner Graham Maule) many collections of original hymns and songs. He was Convenor and Music

Editor on the committee which drafted the Church of Scotland's fourth edition of its church hymnary which was published in 2005. Within CH4, John (along with Graham) have contributed many hymns – including within the Easter section of the hymnary. However, the featured hymn is number 409, "Jesus is risen, alleluia; contained within the section on "Christ Risen – Resurrection and Exaltation" written by Bernard Kyamanywa. Rev Kyamanywa wrote the original Swahili text (with the title Mfurahini) while he was attending the Lutheran Seminary in Tanzania. He wrote it in African style, envisioning a story-teller and congregation responding. The English language version contained within CH4 was written by John Bell. The opening lines are shown on the front cover and verse two appears on the back page. The chorus for which invites us to –

Come, let us worship Him, endlessly sing;
Christ is alive, and death loses its sting
Sins are forgiven alleluia!
Jesus is risen, alleluia!
