A word from our Minister... have you got 20 minutes?

I am often a weekly visitor to the car park at Buchanan Galleries as part of the franchise known by parents as dad's or mum's taxi! I am seldom in the car park for more than 20 minutes whilst I collect one of my children. The other night when I went to pay my customary £1.50 (the fee for after 6pm parking), the machine was out of commission. I approached the booth and the attendant upon taking my £10 for my ticket and upon inspecting the time stamped ticket, declared that I didn't need to pay, "as I was just in and I had a 20 minute period of grace." I duly departed with a smile on my face and £10 in my pocket.

But then the financier in me began to work overtime - did that mean if I hadn't paid at the machine in the past, I could have saved.... wait a minute....how much? Could I do that in future, but what if I overran my period of grace! Was that the price of grace - £1.50?

Then the theologian in me kicked in, and I was taken back to something a colleague shared with me just before Easter. On a course the tutor asked us all to tell of an occasion we had been in a difficult situation, and to tell the group of the wise counsel that had aided us. That could have been a passage of scripture, a Biblical figure, a fellow Christian, a relative, a friend, or even a stranger in a fluorescent yellow jacket. My colleague spoke of a former professor of psychology who had greatly influenced him.

Afterwards he directed me to materials she has on-line. But that was before Easter and I forgot all about it.

However when I got home from being dad the taxi driver, I recalled what my colleague had said and googled the professor's reflection on grace. She explains grace as something unexpected, at times without reason. That is what Jesus death and resurrection at Easter were about. We had sinned, and a price had to be paid. And that price was paid for us by God's willingness to allow His own Son to die for us. We did not deserve it or expect such a sacrifice, yet God's grace was freely given in love. Now that grace is worth a whole lot more to me than the £1.50 I saved one Monday night, or the many pounds I could have saved over the last year! Amazing grace. Thank God for that.




On Sunday 22nd May, 2016 we will celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Baptism.

Treasurer's Report

Firstly this month, I would like to appeal once again for donations to offset the cost of the Springfield Record. I'm sure you will agree that it is a pleasure to read such a professionally produced colour church magazine 9 times a year! The recommended donation is £5 per household per year to cover the printing and stationery costs. Simply place your donation in an envelope marked "Church Record" and place in the offering basket any Sunday. A great many members already give a donation annually and this is most appreciated. Thanks to everyone who contributes!

We still await our Q3 2015 and Q4 2015 General Fund tax recoveries from HMRC. I am pleased to say in tax year 2016/17 that we will we able to claim £2,000 in tax recoveries under the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme. This has increased from £1,250 in tax year 2015/16.

In May we will pay our annual insurance premium of £3,650 for cover on the church buildings and the manse.

On the Front cover this month



This month's contribution to our overview of Scottish Hymn writers has, at one and the same time, both an actual and a tenative Scottish link. The gentleman in question is John Gowans and he was born in Blantyre on 13th November 1934. But truth be told the vast majority of his life was spent in the midlands of England; for his parents were Salvation Officers and they were posted as

required across citadels in England. John himself had a life long connection with the Salvation Army. He entered the International Training College in London in 1954 as a candidate of the "soulwinners" session. There he met Cadet Gisele Bobhotal, who had entered training from Paris, and they married in 1957. John and Gisele became parents of two sons, John-Marc and Christophe. John rose to the rank of General and became the Salvation Army's 16th international leader between 1999 and 2002.

He was also a prolific lyricist and composer and in collaboration with his life long friend John Larsson he wrote over 200 hymns and worship songs, many of which still appear in the Salvation Army song book. In addition he and his friend also wrote, produced and staged ten religious musicals. (Details of his

General Gowans served as leader during a time of decreased recruitment of new officers; he endeavoured to introduce various strategies of flexibility and change – but all underpinned by his stated mission statement of "saving souls, growing saints and serving suffering humanity". A mission statement we can all draw from. General Gowans also looked to "soften" the image and presentation of officers; he himself wore the formal uniform with pride but contemporaneously acknowledged that it was perhaps more related to a previous age and their was a need to

adapt to such as t-shirts for younger officers. It is excellent to observe on the SA On-line store page, such modern articles of clothing - still with the "blood and fire" badge emblazoned upon them - are contained within a section called, "Witness Wear". (Of passing reflection – there is also a section on the SA on-line store where one can



obtain any musical instrument that you would expect to see being played in a proper SA Band. And yes, that does include, for the very reasonable sum of £24.95, that you can obtain a tambourine. For a mere £1.99 extra you can also obtain the ribbons to go with it. And with an eye to the future, for the equally reasonable sum of £14.95 one can obtain a junior tambourine!).

Space within this magazine does not permit listing all of General John Gowans many accomplishments and contributions to faith expansion. A wonderful and insightful obituary can be read on-line at

In addition, General John Gowans was encouraged to write his own autobiography; it is a slim volume of just over 120 pages – but is a fascinating account of a life lived in the faith. I have passed a copy to Mervyn with a request for it to be made available through our own church library. The title is "There is a boy here"; which at first glance one would think would perhaps relate to a childhood incident. But no – true to his faith John Gowans chose from a scriptural passage. If you look up John 6:9 you will see that the title reflects that all and everyone can provide worthy service to the Lord.

We are now officially in Springtime; the photograph on the front cover is a wholly honest reflection of living in Glasgow at this season as it was in fact shot in the month of May! The lyrics shown are the first verse of John Gowan's hymn, "You can't stop the rain from falling down".

General John Gowans was promoted to glory on 8th December 2012.
