A word from our Minister - light shines in earthenware pots (2 Corinthians 4:6-7)



After a recent Wednesday morning Service, over a cup of coffee or tea, sitting in the Hall of Fellowship, we were chatting about the pressures of modern day living. Of the stresses faced by those in work, of family difficulties, and of how suddenly when you least expect it, a 'crack' can open up in your life.

In my mind I imagine a house. Every time a crack appears in the wall, or damage in the house, I dash out to repair it as quickly as I can, like most of us would do, so that the inside of the house is protected and kept safe from the weather and the storms. And the Lord says to me, "This is what the Christian life is like. Whenever any cracks appear in the wall that has been built up around you over the years by the world and by yourself – you dash out and you fill in the cracks so that no one is able to see what is inside. But I want the world to be able to see what is inside. I want to be able to come in through the cracks into your life and I am not going to fill them up either, I am going to flow in and out of these cracks. So when you see the cracks appear in your life, do not rush out and fill them in. Let **ME** come in."

Why not look up 2 Corinthians, Chapter 4, verses 6-7, as you reflect on the image above which comes from Salisbury Cathedral, and look afresh at the cracks in your life, before you rush to do anything with them. You might just see things in a whole new light.

P.S. If this article has sparked a flame of curiosity and you have access to the internet, why not Google Salisbury Cathedral, and search for the Blog comment posted on 6/7/2014 by the Canon Precentor, Tom Clammer, entitled 'Jars of Clay but full of light.'


