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A word from our Minister...

Just the other day I walked into the corner of my garage up and over door and managed to make a deep gash in my forehead. As I fell to my knees clenching my head, searching for a rag in the garage to stench the flow of blood, I found myself looking around to see if any of my neighbours had witnessed my accident. No one was around! What was even more remarkable was that I was wearing my glasses at the time. Now I haven't always worn spectacles. For me they are a relatively new phenomenon. With them, the world around me is supposed to clearer.

This has set me thinking about our faith. Often we use metaphors connected to eyesight when talking of our faith. We are given the gift of new eyes. We see visions. We are good Sunday School pupils! Scratch that last one.

Such phrases are helpful but I am told that they pale into insignificance compared to the results that can be achieved by cataract surgery. Post surgery people can see the world in a brighter and clearer fashion. Colours in the house can even take on a new and seldom imagined hue.

This change of clarity in vision is, metaphorically, what each of us Sunday and Wednesday worshippers' hopes for from the Service of the Word, especially in our Reformed tradition, from the sermon.

We arrive after a week when most of our ups were downs and many of our letters were bills. We're tired, distressed by something we've experienced, or maybe even full of lightness and joy we can't quite explain.

Into this distorted condition we open ourselves to the Word of God, as some confessions would express it, to have the Word 'properly preached'. We yearn for that Word to slice into our blurred or faint vision of God's will for our lives and show us a clear way forward.

We long for God's Word because even though it's true that we read Scripture, the reality is that Scripture also reads us. As it does that, it can remove our metaphorical cataracts and implant in our hearts new visions of the people we're called to be and what we're called to do.

Now, where did I leave my glasses again? I need vital new sight!

In our April magazine it was reported that at its February meeting the Kirk Session agreed to the appointment of Jim Webster as our Pastoral Assistant from March 1st. 2014. Jim had previously been attached to our congregation during a period of training to become an Ordained Local Minister. During his training Jim took the decision to remain a Reader.

I write now to advise those of you who have not already heard the sad news that Jim died peacefully on 29th. May, 2014 after a short illness at the Prince & Princess of Wales Hospice, Carlton Place, Glasgow. Jim was a member of Kinning Park Parish Church, a Reader and very active member of the Presbytery of Glasgow. His funeral Service was held at Kinning Park Parish Church on Friday, 6th June, at 10.30am, which was followed by a private family committal. Office-bearers and members of the congregation were able to attend the Service at Kinning Park and our deepest condolences have been conveyed to Jim's widow, Theresa, and his wider family.

Treasurer's Report

This being the final magazine of the session I would just like to take the opportunity to wish everyone a very pleasant summer. Hopefully those hot and sunny days will be with us soon!

Thanks to all the regular "givers" for your offerings. Whether you give by weekly envelopes or bankers order, your contributions are much appreciated and mean that we can meet our regular ongoing expenses. Even over the summer months our average outgoings will still be nearly £9,500 per month without taking into account any one-off expenditure items which may crop up.

The General Fund has a deficit for the year of £6,587 as at 29th May. We await settlement of the Q4 2013 General Fund Tax claim together with the Q1 2014 General Fund tax claim from HMRC. These tax recoveries should be with us shortly. Outgoings are broadly in line with the budget set out as the beginning of the year.

Finally, I would like to appeal once again for donations to offset the cost of the Springfield Record. I'm sure you will agree that it is a pleasure to read such a professionally produced church magazine 9 times a year! The recommended donation is £5 per household per year to cover the printing and stationery costs. Simply place your donation in an envelope marked "Church Record" and place in the offering basket any Sunday. A great many members already give a donation annually and this is most appreciated. 268th Glasgow Company The Boys' Brigade

Another session has come and gone, where does the time go. Well it goes in a veritable flash if you are working with young people and here at the 268^{th} we have indeed had an eventful 2013/14 session.

Let's start with the Anchor Boy Section. Here we saw a continuing increase in Boy numbers and with some 26 new recruits at the start of the session our numbers peaked at 50 dropping off to 46 regular attendees throughout the session. Friday evenings continued to be fun filled and interesting events and the Boys also took part in several Springburn District events including a Halloween party, a craft day and a Commonwealth Games day. An excellent Parent's Night was held on Friday 16th May when all of the activities the Boys had been working on came together under a Commonwealth Games theme with highlights being the senior Boys singing "Waltzing Matilda" whilst dancing with a kangaroo and their excellent rendition of New Zealand's Maori Hake.

On the Junior Section front an increase in Boy numbers was also evidenced thanks largely to a good intake of Boys from the Anchor Boy Section at the start of the session and our numbers remained at 26 throughout the session. Thursday evenings saw a huge variety of events taking place and included everything from archery and curling through to the familiar such as parachute games, hockey, football, cricket and many other activities. Involvement in Springburn District activities was limited due largely to the difficulty in finding Boys willing to take part in activities outside of a Thursday evening, I think Boys just have so many other options available to them by way of other activities and if Saturday is a football day or a swimming day or whatever then regrettably the BB takes second place.

Back on Thursday 27th March the Section held a very interesting Parent's Night where the theme was a mixed one covering the Winter Olympics, the upcoming Commonwealth Games not forgetting the Ryder Cup with the Boys Parents and staff thoroughly enjoying the event as did our Chaplain Ian Taylor who in the course of the evening took part in a mini golf event with a (small) degree of skill in the sport in evidence.

The Company Section numbers remained low this session with 16 Boys attending regularly but if numbers were low spirits most certainly were not

and a high degree of enthusiasm from the Boys and staff was clearly evident with a wide ranging programme covering the BB badgework scheme and participation in several District, Battalion and National competitions and events not to mention several events which took place outside of our normal meeting night.

All of these awards were formally presented to the Boys at our end of session Church Parade on Sunday 18th May 2014 at which all three Sections of the Company attended.

In addition to awards to Boys unusually several presentations were also made to staff during this service, these were for long service to the Brigade. Bronze awards for ten plus years of service were made to Lieutenants Iain Ingram and Gordon Muir, silver awards for twenty plus years of service to Lieutenants Alan and James Kerr and a gold award for thirty years of service to the Company was presented to Lieutenant Gillian Round.

Overall we have had a very good session and have kept some 88 Boys fully occupied and interested with a wide range of activities over a nine month period.
