A word from our Minister ... you have never travelled on this path before...

On the 14th of November I returned to the Fracture Clinic at Glasgow Royal Infirmary and the doctor was pleased with my progress and after an examination advised me that my tendon has healed, albeit it is weak, which was to be expected. He subsequently discharged me and advised me to continue to wear my 'boot' for a further two weeks to protect the healing and to allow time for a referral to physiotherapy to kick in.

I was hopeful of a phased return to work during Advent but having now seen my GP I have been advised that this will not be possible until the New Year. The current plan is for my phased return to begin on January 1st. 2017 assuming physiotherapy are happy with my continuing improvements.

I am trying to walk a little further daily, but not too much for fear of further damage.

I am grateful for your forbearance and prayerful support during my absence and indebted to Rev Mark Johnstone of St Mary's Church, Kirkintilloch the Interim Moderator and to Rev Jim Gemmell of Kenmure Church who continues to provide emergency pastoral care cover. Further updates will follow in due course.

who comes to offer us life in all its true fullness, the Christ child Himself, Jesus!

Treasurer's Report

This being the final magazine of the year, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Merry Christmas. Thanks to all the "regular" givers in the congregation for your offerings in 2016. Your support is very much appreciated and this means that we can meet our planned expenditure throughout the year.

We still await settlement from HMRC of our 2016 Q1, Q2 and Q3 General Fund (Including Gift Aid Small Claims) tax claims totalling around £15,500 together with another £2,150 in respect of other tax recoveries on the 150 Fund and the Fabric Fund.

By the time you read this article we will have made our final payment of $\pounds 8,037$ for our Ministries and Mission Allocation of 2016.

The deficit on the General Fund for the year-to 16/11/2016 is £2,373 (see below) and I am pleased to say that we remain on course to meet our budgeted figures for the full year.

The Junior Section staff rightly marked lain Ingram's lengthy service with a staff night out with lain also being presented with vouchers for La Vita in order that he might take his wife Ann and family for a night out at a time suitable to all. A few weeks later lain attended a Junior Section night, where in addition to making him work, he was presented with a silver Quaich which was engraved to record his years of service to the Section.

However, the 268th is nothing if not resilient and we have been able to add to the Anchor Boy staff two of our former Company Section Boys, Jacob Currie and Ross Gill and to the staff of the Junior Section Matthew Russell a Queen's Man of the Company.

Two of our Junior Section staff members have recently completed Youth Leader training under the auspices of Glasgow Battalion, Amanda McAra and the aforementioned Matthew Russell and by the time you read this both should have been appointed as Lieutenants of the 268th Glasgow.



It is also pleasing to note that four of our Company Section Boys are currently working towards gaining the Brigade's highest award, the Queen's Badge and these are: Jamie Blackhall, Andrew Irving, Rory McDonald and Callum Russell. Andrew and Rory are currently working on their leadership in the Brigade element and are helping out with the Boys of the Junior Section and Jamie and Callum will start that element of their work early in the new year

As our readers will be aware, our Company works throughout the session to raise funds for ourselves by holding Coffee Mornings, Quiz Nights, delivering Christmas cards and a host of other things but I particularly want to mention one event of this year in which the whole Company took part and, in line with our aim of caring for others, we participated in The Boys' Brigade/Church of Scotland World Mission Fund appeal. This year the appeal was aimed at the work of the Boys' and Girls' Brigade in Kenya and this seemed to capture the imagination of our Boys as we raised a total of £1050.00 for the appeal. This appeal is normally the remit of the Junior Section but we were able to boost our givings to the appeal thanks to the involvement of the Boys of both our Anchor and Company Sections so well done to all the Boys who helped raise this magnificent sum.

Our Girls' Brigade Company also took part in this appeal although separately from the BB fund raising.

I expect that my Officer's in Charge will be submitting articles for this edition of the magazine so I had better not steal any more of their thunder than I already have done and it remains only for me to wish all our readers, friends and supporters of the Company a very Merry Christmas and best wishes for 2017.

Remembrance

Along with others of the church and community I attended at the Auchinairn War Memorial at 11am on the 11th Day of November. This was a well attended event and a group of the Primary 7 children from Auchinairn School were also there. One of the children was selected by the duty teacher to lay a wreath at the memorial which he did with great decorum. By sheer coincidence the young man selected to do this was Callum who is a member of the 268th BB Company Section

Remembrance Sunday on the 13th November was also a very well attended event and indeed in my view, and that of others, it was the best attended Remembrance attendance at Auchinairn in many years. The afternoon began with a short service of worship at the Auchinairn Community Centre and thereafter members of the wider church, the community and the representatives of the local churches, the Council, the Community Council, the Army, the Boys' Brigade, Girl's Brigade and the local Brownie group all braved the poor weather conditions and proceeded to the War Memorial to lay their wreaths in remembrance of all who had served, fought and died in the service of their Country in conflicts over the past century.

The laying of the poppy wreaths is particularly poignant but we must also remember that each poppy wreath laid represents a donation to Poppy Scotland the organisation which exists to assist soldiers, sailors and air crew, male or female, who have been injured or traumatised in conflict.

Those of us involved in Springfield Cambridge Church also donate most notably by giving to Poppy Scotland through the placing of money into a collecting can held by members of our own Boys' Brigade and Girls' Brigade Companies. Boys and Girls of both organisations undertook this role over four Sundays from 23rd October until 13th November and, thanks to the generosity of the folks of Springfield Cambridge, I can tell you that the sum raised by means of the collecting cans was £281.65. My sincere thanks go to all of the Boys and Girls who helped in raising this sum.

A retiring offering taken on Sunday 13th November provided a further £183.90 which has allowed the Church to make a total donation to Poppy Scotland £454.56 which that organisation has now received and they have thanked us for our generous donation. *George McMillan*


