

A word from our Minister ...

Recently I attended a meeting where we were asked to share memories of a friend and colleague who had died after a very short illness at the end of last year. Michael was a man whom I had not known for terribly long, but during our friendship he made a lasting impression upon me. He had led a fascinating life of ministry in the church with many twists and turns, but at his heart was a pastor of quiet leadership. Dag Hammarskjold is quoted as having said, "The

humility that comes from others having faith in you..." The quote is incomplete, yet relentless with its reminder that others have faith in us. There is an overwhelming humility in receiving faith, and the ...

How should we complete that sentence? People place a vote of faith in us and that stirs a deep humility within us as we are all too aware of our own human limitations. We are anxious that the faith of others in us could evaporate. That is not a new phenomenon. The great leaders of life have always been reluctant. They had other plans for life. But something happened to push them into a responsible role. It wasn't really their skills or CV's, and certainly not their ambition.

Mostly, the great leaders were just true believers in a cause. And the people around them had faith that they could make a difference. And some did. But there is no evidence that these leaders were having a good time along the way, but they knew what they had to do.

Gregory the Great was one of the best popes ever. He saved Rome form economic, political, and spiritual crisis in the 6^{th} . Century. But he only wanted to be a monk. He called himself a "contemplative condemned to action." That reluctance is one of the reasons he is known in history as "the Great."

Now I realise that you did not know my friend Michael, but for me and others who knew him, he was a "great" man. Great because he lived a life of faith in humility and a life in which his values translated into good actions. He mirrored the Golden Rule, "to do to others as you wish them to do to you" (St. Matthew 7:12, St. Luke 6:31.) That always sounds to me like Good News, and an aspiration worthy as an ideal, and well worth applying in action. Contemplative action. May it be so for you and for me.

Stated Annual Meeting (SAM) 2017 - Tuesday 28th March 2017, 7.00 pm. - Cambridge Chapel. Changes which were introduced some years ago by the Office of the Scottish Charity

Regulator (OSCR) mean that at this

meeting in the Cambridge Chapel the 2016 Annual accounts will be received by the congregation. The Trustees will previously have met to approve them on Sunday 26th. February, 2017 as required by OSCR.

This year, the Congregational Board would be pleased to welcome new or returning members of the Board to serve for a three year term. This is an important meeting in the life of our Congregation and you are encouraged to consider serving the church in this way. Volunteers are needed each year.

Treasurer's Report

Enclosed with this magazine is a statement of summary accounts is shown for 2016 which showing a surplus on the General Fund of £2,449 for the year (after a transfer of £346 to the Manse Fund). A full statement of accounts will be submitted to the Stated Annual Meeting on 28th March and I would urge as many members to attend this short but important meeting. The main financial aspects are as follows: -

- Surplus on the General Fund of £2,449 for 2016 (excluding legacy income)
- We took full advantage of the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme (GADS) and claimed the maximum allowable of £2,000 in respect of Open Plate/FWO General Fund Offerings.
- Number of Gift Aid Donors as at 31st December 2016 is 224 (240 as at 31st December 2015) with an additional 11 members who also give tax efficiently at certain periods during the year depending on their circumstances.
- General Fund Offerings (excluding tax recoveries) decreased year on year by just over 2%.
- Ordinary General Expenditure up by 1.4% compared with 2015.

- Since Year End 2016 we have received settlement of all outstanding HMRC tax claims totalling £23,522 which includes £2,583 attributable to the 150 Fund.
- Fees for Rental of the Premises totalling £24,338 in 2016 with continued high demand for the use of our excellent suite of halls and rooms with minimal overheads to the church.

How many opportunities do we get these days to reflect on how fortunate we are and in the words of the old hymn to "Count your Blessings"? It's something James and I have reflected upon over the past few years on attending the Homelessness Service at Lodging House Mission. We have been equally blessed in being able to witness first-hand the invaluable work that LHM carries out in our city.

The service is of course open to all and is attended by service users, staff and members of congregations throughout the city. One is sadly used to seeing "service users" as homeless persons on our streets; here it is supremely uplifting to then see certain "service users" taking part and leading worship through the reading of scripture. Truly, it is quite awesome to worship at such an inclusive service.

This year the speaker at this year's Homelessness Service was the Right Rev. Dr Russell Barr, Moderator of the General Assembly. Homelessness is an issue close to Dr Barr's heart and in fact he describes it as a scandal in 21st century Scotland. He told us about the charity in Edinburgh, called Fresh Start, which he was instrumental in setting up and he cited two examples of how people have been helped by the charity; emphasising that homelessness can happen to anybody at any time. The sermon came straight from his heart and his passion was obvious.

After the Benediction was pronounced he was presented with a gift of a painting created by one of the service users which he said would be given pride of place in his manse at Cramond. The Moderator and his wife circulated after the service when refreshments were served and spoke to almost everybody there – service users and those from other churches – all worshippers together.

Once again it was a chance to see first-hand the range of work undertaken by LHM from the provision of meals through to education and on to seeing that the building was set up as a night shelter to provide a safe place from the bitter elements of winter.

As the words of the hymn say "When upon life's billows you are tempest-tossed, When you are discouraged, thinking all is lost, Count your many blessings, name them one by one,

And it will surprise you what the Lord has done." Going to this service is truly one of those blessings. And remember – all are welcome at next years service.


The grand total raised from our Christmas Concerts for CHAS now stands at a magnificent £276,474.

I am extremely grateful to Mr Jim Scott, our Session Clerk, for passing on this extremely interesting newspaper article – which appeared back in 1953 – and which relates to the three stained glass windows that can be seen behind what is now the stage in the top hall.

From a legacy left to Springfield Church of Scotland by Mr Thomas Scott, the Viewfield Drive, Bishiopbriggs, who died on 4 December 1952 and who was a former office-bearer of the church, the office -bearers decided to earmark a portion of the money for a memorial to Mr Scott.

At the forenoon service Sunday, 27th December, the Rev. H.J. French dedicated three stained glass windows which have been placed behind the pulpit, in memory of Mr Scott. The centre window has the Cross, one has a figure in the attitude of praise, and the other one has a figure in the attitude of Prayer. Mr Scott, who was well known in the city of Glasgow, carried on business as a coal merchant, and was head of the firm of Thomas Scott & Co., Ltd.

Mt French said in dedicating those windows as a memorial to Mr Scott, who was a former office-bearer, member of the choir, and a member of the church for over 30 years, a precedent has been set, for it is the first time in this congregation, which had its origin 110 years ago, that an office -bearer has been commemorated. In these unique circumstances, it is fitting I should say something regarding one the glow of whose personality, I understand, lighted the way for others. As a member of the Deacons' Court, he was a valuable asset on all occasions. His colleagues never saw him ruffled. He was incapable of harbouring a single mean thought, for his courage and deep religious conviction carried him through. In him, the church had a generous giver, and though with advancing years his attendance slackened, his benevolence continued. God loveth a cheerful giver, and he was in that category. Every life has its own cross of sorrow, sometimes hidden, sometimes revealed, and he had had his cup full, for death early in life robbed him of those he loved, yet he never murmured nor complained. To-day by these windows, we commemorate the life of a very useful and blameless man who loved this sanctuary. The writer, as a former colleague in the Deacons' Court of Springfield Church, can truly say it was
