

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A word from our Minister...under pressure...the dog, the hedge, the glasses and me!

A Happy New Year to all our "Record" readers. I hope you have had a good Christmas and the New Year has begun well for you. Between Christmas and New Year our hospitals have been 'under pressure' as you will have no doubt read and heard elsewhere. While doing my 'hospital rounds' I have been acutely aware of how the winter, the flu and other illnesses have taken their toll on our members and those who care for them in hospital or at home. Pressure it seems is all around. "Pressure that brings a building down, splits a family in two, puts people on streets. It's the terror of knowing what the world is about." Under pressure. Few of us can go through life without experiencing pressure at some point or another.

The challenge of course is always how best to respond to pressure. Do you give in? Lie down and simply give up? Or do you fight back, get up and keep on going? I suppose that depends on the circumstances.

Shortly after New Year, I experienced a small degree of pressure myself. Our dog, Mack who is now 20 months old, is an escape artist. He loves nothing better than to sneak out the front door and tear off down the street (off the lead) with me in hot pursuit. I always seem to be the one playing the retriever part!

Having escaped, I chased after him, to his obvious delight. In an effort to curtail his doggy activities I lunged at him to catch his collar. Instead with speed and power he simply knocked me into the hedge where I landed on all fours, my glasses landing on the grass beside me. As he passed me a second time, to his immense indignation I clutched a clump of his rear flank which stopped him in his tracks and I was able to get him back into the house, Not before my neighbour came over to help me, who observed that my forehead was bleeding profusely (from the hedge), and where were my glasses.? On the ground, but thankfully not broken. Under pressure.

The challenge of course is always how best to respond to pressure. Do you give in? Lie down and simply give up? Or do you fight back, get up and keep on going?

I realise this element of pressure I felt was minimal, and as I write this my experience is now quite comical. But as we approach our February Communion, I am reminded when under pressure; I find the words of Jesus hugely comforting and helpful,

"'Come to me, all who are weary and whose load is heavy;

I will give you rest.

'Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble—hearted; and you will find rest for your souls." St. Matthew 11:28—29

On Christmas Day, we expect to feed up to 100 service users and your kind donation will help us greatly with our festive costs.

We are very aware that we can only offer our service users the services we do due to the generosity of faithful supporters such as yourselves, so please accept our grateful thanks for all you do for us at Springfield Cambridge.

May God bless you all abundantly this Christmas Season and into the New Year.

Treasurer's Report

Happy New Year to you all!

The year- end accounts for 2017 are in the process of being prepared and I am pleased to say that once again have a surplus on the General Fund for the year. Early indications show that our General Income will exceed the General Expenditure by circa £2,336 (excluding the late settlement of General Fund Tax Claims from 2016 totalling £19,899). Gift Aid Donations on the General Fund for the year total £80,227 with the tax claimed back by HMRC on that amount being approximately £20,056. Thanks to all the "regular givers" for your offerings during 2017 and in particular to the many members who recently reviewed their giving which has resulted in General Gift Aid offerings for 2017 being 5.2% higher than 2016.

Our Mission and Ministries Allocation that we pay centrally to The Church of Scotland will be £75,940 in 2018 and this is payable in 10 equal instalments from February to November. This figure is arrived at by taking in consideration our General Fund Income Base in 2014, 2015 and 2016. Our General Fund Income reduced slightly in 2015 and 2016 and this has resulted in our Allocation being lower than in 2017 which was £78,644. In addition, our Presbytery dues for 2018 will be £4,131 and these are payable over 3 quarterly equal instalments to the Presbytery of Glasgow from March to September. The full budget will go before the Congregational Board for approval on 6th February and I will include a copy in the March magazine.


Springfield Cambridge Festival Chorus & Orchestra - Bishopbriggs Churches Together

Prisoners Week 19-26 November 2017

We passed on this affirmative story to our Minister, who filed it for future reference and so now has it in print to remind him.

"Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them." **Hebrews 13:3**

Prisoners Week took place in the third week of November and this is an initiative of the Churches (including the Church of Scotland) which aims to stimulate discussion, highlight concerns and share hope, in prisons and communities across Scotland.

The National Launch Service for Prisoners Week took place on Monday 20th November in St Margaret's of Scotland RC Church in Stirling. The Service featured a variety of participants; ministers and preachers across a range of denominations as well contributions from those who have served time in prison.

Those present in the church included the Chief Executive of the Scottish Prison Service, serving Prison Officers, Former inmates, family members of serving prisoners as well as current prisoners from HMP Glenochil and HMP Castle Huntly.

We were glad to have at last managed to attend this service; it was an inspiring and moving act of worship. Further, the traditional tea and cake hospitality served in the hall after the service was an interesting experience – as one ascertained whether the person you were sipping tea together with was freeman or prisoner. Truly it brought home that we are indeed all equal in the eyes of the Lord.

And the victims of crime were not overlooked – they were rightly remembered during the worship and in prayer.

The ex-prisoner who gave his testament expressed genuine regret and remorse for his actions. It certainly stimulated prayerful thought about our Christian duty to be forgiving towards those who are truly repentant; as our own Minister reminds us each Sunday during his opening prayer. The testament provider concluded with a thought provoking statement, "I'm an ex-con, a bevy merchant – and Christ died on the Cross for me."

On the Front Cover this Month

Martin Luther had a great love of music, was a skilled musician himself and in his lifetime, wrote many hymns and pieces of choral music. His own letter that follows exemplifies his convictions about the role of music in the act of Christian worship

Foreword to Georg Rhau's Collection, "Symphoniae iucundae".

"I, Doctor Martin Luther, wish all lovers of the unshackled art of music grace and peace from God the Father and from our Lord Jesus Christ! I truly desire that all Christians would love and regard as worthy the lovely gift of music, which is a precious, worthy, and costly treasure given to mankind by God.

The riches of music are so excellent and so precious that words fail me whenever I attempt to discuss and describe them.... In summary, next to the Word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in the world. It controls our thoughts, minds, hearts, and spirits...

Our dear fathers and prophets did not desire without reason that music be always used in the churches. Hence, we have so many songs and psalms. This precious gift has been given to man alone that he might thereby remind himself that God has created man for the express purpose of praising and extolling God.

However, when man's natural musical ability is whetted and polished to the extent that it becomes an art, then do we note with great surprise the great and perfect wisdom of God in music, which is, after all, His product and His gift; we marvel when we hear music in which one voice sings a simple melody, while three, four, or five other voices play and trip lustily around the voice that sings its simple melody and adorn this simple melody wonderfully with artistic musical effects, thus reminding us of a heavenly dance, where all meet in a spirit of friendliness, caress and embrace.

A person who gives this some thought and yet does not regard music as a marvellous creation of God, must be a clodhopper indeed and does not deserve to be called a human being; he should be permitted to hear nothing but the braying of asses and the grunting of hogs."
