

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# Letter from our Minister

In September of this year, officebearers and members of the congregation attended a series of three meetings with our Parish

Grouping friends from Cadder and Kenmure Churches, led by Robbie Morrison, a Mission and Discipleship Facilitator. The purpose of these meetings was to look towards our common shared purposes and to create a vision for the future in Bishopbriggs given the Church of Scotland's desire for 'radical change.'

On the early morning of Friday 13th of September, after the second of these sessions, I was driving down Balmuildy Road towards Hilton Road. Directly in front of the car ahead of me was a young cyclist making his way towards Meadowburn Primary School. As a cyclist myself, I watched as he navigated his way down the hill towards a large white van which was parked half on the road, and half on the pavement just beyond Muirton Drive. At the same time a bus had just turned onto Balmuildy Road from Hilton Road. The car in front of me decided to overtake the cyclist which was a curious manoeuvre. I could almost hear the cyclist's mental cogs turning as internally he debated what to do next, with a bus approaching him on the opposite side, and a parked van in front of him on his side of the road. By this point I had reduced my own speed and with a sense of time slowing down and foreboding growing, I watched as he turned sharply to the left intending to mount the pavement and ride on the 'inside' of the parked van as it were.

Before it had happened, I knew what the outcome would be. Instead of addressing the curb at a straight angle he hit it side on and went crashing over the handlebars onto the pavement. Fortunately, his helmet protected his head, but his right elbow and his left knee and shin took quite a beating. All this occurred within seconds although the time sequence felt like an eternity. When it was safe to stop I did so, parked my car and walked back to see if I could help. Meanwhile the traffic continued on its rush hour commute and the world kept turning on its axis. I helped Daniel, a P7 pupil to his feet, righted his bike and had him sit down on a garden wall to draw his breath. Once I had checked his injuries, he got his phone out and phoned his mum, and I spoke to her to reassure her and offered to wait with him until she arrived. All the while, the traffic continued to journey on. But then things began to happen which reminded of the phrase, 'it takes a village to raise a child.' The owner of the house on whose wall Daniel was sitting came out to offer his help, fetching a glass of water for the shock, while I wittered on trying to distract Daniel from his torn trousers and badly bleeding and grazed knee and shin. After a while another neighbour from down the street, sporting a pair of cycling shorts himself, came up to ask me if I needed to get to work, he would wait with the boy! Mum in due course arrived and took her son off to get him medically checked out. But what of Daniel's bike I hear you saying? From another house two doors down came a workman who asked mum what her address was, put Daniel's bike into the back of his van and said he'd drop it off that morning. That in a sense is where my story ends - for I trust and pray that Daniel is none the worse for his accident.

But it set me thinking. The night before we had been thinking all about the future with Robbie Morrison. And that is a good thing to do. But I was also struck by the fact that often the present is all we have. 'Yesterday is history, tomorrow is a mystery, and today is a gift - that is why it is called the present.' Today, the present is all that we have. Tomorrow is yet to come and may well not shape up as we anticipate. So perhaps we need to reflect on how we are using the here and now.

I had been worrying about what would emerge from our Future Focus discussions - what did God want for our future? I don't know what that is, but I do know this. God is already at work in our community, in the people of Bishopbriggs who come out of their homes, workplaces, leisure and stop to help a boy on a bike in need. Yes, we need an eye to our future, but we must be careful not to lose sight of what God is doing in the here and now. In the words of the hymn, "God is working his purpose out", we are reminded of the words of the minor prophet, Habakkuk, who has a major word for us, "For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD, as the waters cover the sea." (Habakkuk 2:14)



# **News from Kirk Session**

#### FUTURE FOCUS

The Kirk Session has engaged with the Future Focus process of which the Minister has already referred to in this Edition of our Magazine. Should anyone like to see the summary reports, please contact the Minister or the Session Clerk and they will provide you with an electronic or paper copy. The next step from this process will be the consideration of the materials by the 3 congregations and a follow up meeting with the Ministers and the Facilitator, Robbie Morrison. More details to follow in the New Year.

# CHARITY POLICY

As a congregation we are a registered charity .From time to time we are approached by individuals or other charities to run or support charity events in our Church buildings. Given the level of recent such activity it is felt that we probably should have some general guidelines or principles in terms of what we agree to. Under the Parish Ministries Act Ministers have the capacity to give their church buildings for ecclesiastical, charitable or educational purposes free of charge. After much discussion, with valued input from many, there was agreement that the following Policy be adopted and reviewed by the Kirk Session after one year:

# Charity Policy of Springfield Cambridge Church (SCC)

This Policy applies to all charity events where such events are not connected to the Church of Scotland and / or SCC. This Policy can only be overridden by agreement of the Kirk Session of Springfield Cambridge Church.

Charitable events to be held at the Church Building must be approved by the Minister of SCC in accordance with the Parish Ministries Act. At the sole discretion of the Minister the hire may be free of charge or at a sum determined by the Minister.

SCC will not support, or allow its buildings, Orders of Service, website or Face book pages, or Church magazine to be used for the purpose of supporting (selling tickets or advertising) an event for another charity.

The exception to this is where the charity event is sponsored by a member of SCC and the Minister agrees that the event may be advertised by notice in our Orders of Service, website or Face book pages and /or our Church magazine.

# HALL OF FELLOWSHIP

The Kirk Session is aware that at times our Hall of Fellowship can at times be quite crowded as people are welcomed and received into our buildings as they make their way into the Sanctuary for Worship. Sometimes that is because various 'stands' are in operation – perhaps with ticket sales for future church events, or sales of Christmas cards, or home baking. The Kirk Session is giving consideration to whether this is the most appropriate use of this space but is keen to hear from folk who use this space in that way, and from those who find it convenient for such 'stands' to be situated there. Should you wish to make a comment on this, to guide the thinking of the Kirk session, please speak to the Minister or the Session Clerk.

# On the Front Cover – Unsung Heroes of the Nativity Story

The first question is "are there any Unsung Heroes of the Nativity Story?" It's such a well-known story — re-enacted year on year by Church Youth Groups the length and breadth of the country and thus — all the key participants are known. One could suggest that the donkey is a hero for carrying Mary. Except Luke does not mention a donkey — simply that Mary and Joseph travelled to Bethlehem (Luke 2:4). One could suggest that the Innkeeper was a hero — for taking pity on Mary and offering the use of his stable. But again — Luke does not mention any Innkeeper — simply that there "was no room at the inn" (Luke 2:7). Was the Star a hero for guiding the Magi to the Christ child? It is doubtful if a "luminous ball of gas" could be considered a hero. But, as always with the Bible, if one looks closer you inevitably find persons in the background, carrying out God's wishes. And for the Nativity Story one only has to look at an incident adjacent to the main story. The story of Simeon and Anna.

At the Temple, the family is approached by a man named Simeon, who has been told by the Holy Spirit that he will not die until he has seen the Messiah. (The same Spirit told him to go to the Temple that day, too.) Simeon takes the baby Jesus in his arms and praises God (*Luke 2:21-35*)

Anna then approaches the Holy Family. She too recognizes Jesus as the Messiah, but she has a very different reaction: "At that moment, she came and began to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem" (Luke 2:36-38). She is 84 years old, according to Luke, and she does not want to die. She wants to proselytize. Like the disciples who will follow her, she is driven to bear witness to what she has seen. Mary was the first to have the good news announced to her, but Anna is the first woman to fully understand and proclaim the good news.

So, what does this have to do with us in 21st Century Britain? We live in an increasingly secular and materialistic world and it is all too easy to forget the Baby at the centre of the Nativity. Like Simeon and Anna, we need to recognise the presence of the Messiah and publicly proclaim His gospel. Simeon and Anna are truly heroes for proclaiming the true message of the nativity.
