

A word from our Minister: GRACE

"And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." (St. John 1:14)

As we fast approach Christmas, many of you will be well on with your preparations. Others may be less so. I am probably somewhere in between. I probably began slightly earlier this year with certain elements when I was asked to write a piece for the December Edition of Life and Work in mid-September! Traditionally at Christmas time we frequently turn to the Gospel according to St. John probably more than at any other time of the year. We will soon read again those words from the opening of St. John, often referred to as the prologue. They announce the birth and arrival of Jesus in a more 'theological' manner than the versions found in Matthew, Mark and Luke. I love to read, as many of you know. I like to read a range of reading materials. And I love to read that section of St. John each year. Those words "full of grace and truth" always catch me. They are for me hopeful words. And I think we are all in need of some hope as we go into another 'covid19 Christmas.' Often we look for even small signs of hope. Just the other day I was reading of one such sign. It was an announcement made by the New York Public Library (NYPL). And it was beautiful announcement for me, full of grace and truth. The library will no longer charge late fees on overdue items, and it will waive any past accrued fines. This may sound like a small thing, but I suspect its impact will be enormous.

NYPL is the largest library system in the USA and the fourth largest in the world. It is home to 53 million items spread throughout 92 locations. Before its recent decision, more than 400,000 New Yorkers were barred from accessing books because they owed more than \$15 in late fees. Many of them lived in poor neighbourhoods - those with the lowest income and the least capacity to pay fines, many of them children thereby deprived of basic learning tools. As a Scot, with knowledge of the work of Andrew Carnegie and his love of local libraries this story has touched me.

This act by NYPL is a gracious institutional move of an enormous library reaching out into an ungracious world. To unexpectedly erase late fees and trust patrons to return books sounds like the arithmetic of grace. And that's the thing about the five letter word G R A C E - it's undeserved, unexpected and often astonishing. Grace has a way of displacing what we have been taught: Pay your dues or else. There's a charge for that. There's no such thing as a free lunch.

A colleague was apt to say, "grace happens when it finally dawns on you that, in Christ, your past isn't going to catch up on you. Is it any wonder I like St. John 1:14, "And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth."


Thank You

Andrew (Drew) David FLEMING 15/03/40-07/10/21

A modern football is composed of 32 panels - 20 hexagons and 12 pentagons. Given Drew's love of the 'beautiful game' let me use the metaphor of a football to encapsulate Drew's life. Now whilst I could say 32 things about Drew, I will confine myself to a pentagon, a five sided shape, to draw out five aspects of his life.

Family. Born at Stirling Maternity Hospital, this 'son of the rock' was the elder brother to Roy and George, and his early years of education at Banknock Primary School were followed by his secondary education at Kilsyth Academy. A medical condition precluded him from entering into a period of National Service in the forces, and upon passing the entrance examination he began his career with the Civil Service, initially in the Ministry of Labour and National Service in Waterloo Street, Glasgow. Whilst there he was the supervisor to a young woman, Marion McAllister, the only occasion Drew was ever in charge of the woman he took on first date to a Referees Dinner and who became his wife when they were married at Springfield Church on 21/09/66 by Rev. David Hebenton.

Drew and Marion were blessed with the arrival of David and Alison and welcomed their spouses Lesley and Peter and their children Rebecca, Luke, and Owen, Rhys to the expanding family circle. Drew's work took him to Aberdeen city for a while, and from 1967-73 the family lived in a bungalow in Bridge of Don. But in 1973 Marion got her wish to return to Bishopbriggs, settling into 7 Ash Grove. From 1975-79, Marion's father lived with them in an extension to their home. Family holidays were enjoyed in Scarborough, Blackpool and Wales, and later at a Tenerife timeshare as well as trips to Bahrain, the Netherlands and Norway to visit Alison and her family.

Career. Following his time in Waterloo Street, he was later to manage the Job Centres in Bath Street and Springburn, with a brief period of service in Dundee. But a move into the Career

Service in schools took him all over Scotland resulting in him becoming a Careers Service Inspector with offices in Glasgow and Edinburgh until his early retirement at the age of 60.

Football. Despite being ineligible for National Service from the age of 16 for the ensuing 65 years Drew became involved with the Scottish Football Association. In 1961 he became a Senior Linesman, and in 1965 he was to become a Category 1 referee, although he maintained he was promoted too early! He then returned to become a Category 3B referee - in the mid 1970's he was made a couple of appearances at International matches but in 1975 retired due to an injury. This was not the end of his connection to the SFA though - he was Referee Supervisor until he was 70 and for a decade (2010-2020) was a Development Advisor in the junior ranks encouraging many a young new trainee. Additionally for 10 years he was the escort for European Referees when they came to preside over Celtic matches in Glasgow.

Faith. Drew was a Sunday School Teacher in the Senior Sunday School, ordained an Elder on 23/03/1977 and a Presbytery Elder from 2011-2021. He supported Marion and her friend Ann Picket in all that the Ways and Means Committee did to raise funds for the Church and made up many a quiz for the Fund Raising Committee and other groups who could rely on his mental acuity. In 1980 he was a helper at the 268 BB camp and along with Donald McPhee and George Graham performed to great critical acclaim as a comic trio, "The Nairnies." More recently he

enjoyed the weekly Wednesday company and fellowship of his fellow Widowers and Coffin Dodgers!

Measure. His civil nature, good humour, quick wit and gentle nature endeared him to all who met him, not to mention those who heard him speaking publicly - inevitably delivering a talk on either 'Careering Around Scotland,' or 'Refereeing.' The measure of the man Drew Fleming is in not how he died, but how he lived, and of how many were sorry when he passed away. His funeral Services and those watching online were testimony to that and to the fact that Drew has now heard the immortal words of his Eternal Saviour, "Well done my good and faithful servant."

Mission Plan Review Update

The Presbytery of Glasgow
November 2021



As you will know, the Presbytery Plan Review Group has been consulting with congregations across Glasgow on how we can best plan ahead to meet the requirements of the Presbytery Mission Plan Act.

We need to prepare for a future in which we will have 84 ministers in post, a considerable reduction on the present number.

In August we asked all congregations to complete a detailed survey in order to let us see the big picture of how churches are working right across the city. We followed this up in October with a series of online focus groups which gave congregations an opportunity to tell us about their concerns and their priorities. It is encouraging to see that overall 96% of churches took part in the consultation and we are very grateful of this.

Treasurers Report

Thank you once again to all the regular "givers" for all their offerings over the last few months. All contributions are much appreciated whether it is by standing order, cheque, PayPal or offering plate. on a Sunday morning.

Our financial situation has been boosted recently with our Outside Agencies now using our premises again and from this we receive approximately £1,600 per month.

We are still awaiting settlement of numerous tax claims from HMRC in respect of Gift Aid offerings, but we expect these all to settled shortly and the money to be in the church accounts by the year end.

We paid our final Ministries and Mission payment for 2021 of £7,828 to the Church of Scotland on the 15th November 2021. We have also received notice from Church of Scotland that the amount due from Springfield Cambridge Church in 2022 is £82,395. This amount is payable in 10 instalments from February to November and equates to £8,239.50 per month.

At present we have a deficit on the General Fund for the year to date of £12,897 although this should improve significantly over the next few weeks once the tax claims are settled by HMRC.

Finally, have a lovely Christmas season and Best Wishes for 2022.

A final word from James Robertson, Editor, The Record

A number of years back, I read an autobiography about Fridtjof Namsen, Norwegian polymath, arctic explorer and Nobel Peace Prize laureate.
