COVID UPDATE



The Kirk Session agreed on 15/02/22 to some changes (highlighted in red) to procedures around attending Services in Springfield Cambridge Church which took effect from Sunday 20/02/22:

- On the advice of the Scottish Government the Church of Scotland's Covid Group is encouraging everyone to undertake a Lateral Flow Test before coming to Church for whatever reason;
- Hand sanitiser should be used on entry to and exit from the building;
- Face coverings must be worn(unless medically exempt);
- Track and trace details will no longer be required with the exception of those remaining for Tea and Coffee after the Service;
- Worshippers will no longer be shown to their pews;
- Worshippers may choose to sit anywhere in the two main central sections of the Church without the need to socially distance:
- Worshippers who would prefer to maintain 1 metre social distancing should sit comfortably in the left and right side aisle seating areas;
- Worshippers should still exit the Church via the Chancel Fire Escape Doors.

On 21st. March, 2022, further changes are anticipated and these will be confirmed via our website and Face book pages. As you will know the Scottish Government has announced that it expects to remove the Covid Regulations regarding the wearing of face coverings in places of worship from the 21st of March. We have taken this to mean that it will no longer be a legal necessity to wear a face

covering in church buildings - including when singing - but we have yet to see the details.

These changes are being brought in for a number of reasons:-

- the success of the vaccination programme in stemming infections and reducing harms;
- falling rates of Covid infections;
- the availability of antiviral treatments;
- the need for economic and social recovery after two years of pandemic restrictions.

We suspect that for most people the chance to take part in worship without wearing a mask will be very welcome but there will be some who will feel more at risk. While it is true that we cannot order our common life around the most anxious therefore we will maintain the left and right side seating aisles with 1 metre social distancing and individuals will be able to continue to wear a mask should they wish and sit where they like.

The Church's Covid Group in Edinburgh will meet again on 16^{th} March after the next Government review which is scheduled for the 15^{th} and changes will be advised as soon as possible thereafter.

A Word from our Minister: All change here

The reminder arrived from the optician – "it is now two years since you last had an eye test – please contact the practice to arrange your eye test." "It can't possibly be two years since I had an eye test," I thought to myself. Probably because of the last 2 years during which we have lived with so many differing practices of living, work, leisure and worship, my sense of time has shifted out of focus. So maybe I need to book that appointment.

I wonder when I do go - what will have changed - will my vision be the same, have deteriorated, or improved? Will I need a new prescription and new lenses with which to view the world? How will my perspective be altered as a result of the answers to these questions?

Looking around at our world as we expect to emerge from most Covid restrictions on 21/03/22 - almost two years to the date since our first 'lockdown' of the modern era, I am struck by the changes that these two years have brought. It's all change here.

Our practice of Church life has changed significantly - we have had to move 'online' and embrace technology to continue to worship, albeit with some degree of familiarity but also with some new patterns. Some of our meetings as office-bearers have been 'in person' - some remain 'online.' Our central Church has embarked on a very serious process to reduce ministry posts across Scotland. This has led our Presbytery to a new round of Planning for Mission which will dramatically alter the delivery of ministry in our area. It's all change here.

On the world stage, the Western world has been rocked by the events in Ukraine. We saw what happened in Afghanistan, Yemen and Syria and were touched, but somehow what we see in Ukraine feels quite different. What can we do and what do we think about the threat of European violence and the economic impact of this war in our own pockets with rising costs encircling us? It's all change here. I do not have any answers or clarity of vision on these issues, but I am concerned over them and praying for insight as to what part I and you might play for God in this. Amid the changes all around us, more fervently than ever I cling to the promise of Jesus that he is our true constant refuge in times of uncertainty.

The first thing I think we can do is to pray for peace. The Apostle Paul, no stranger to trials and tribulations wrote, "Rejoice always, pray constantly, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thessalonians 5:16-17). The second thing we may be able to do is to offer some financial aid to those caught up in this terrible situation.



The Rev. Balázs Ódor, Ecumenical Officer for the Reformed Church in Hungary, has been in direct contact with the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh and they have been able to contact the Bishop's Office in the Reformed Church in Carpathian Ukraine, and some congregations in Ukraine. It is good to take just a little time to do this, so that the right kind of help is given in a way in which it can be used on the ground where it is needed most.

From these contacts, we suggest that members are offered the opportunity to give, via the Church of Scotland, to Reformed Church in Hungary Aid (RCHA), which is run by our partner, the Reformed Church of Hungary. The RCHA has

access to the Reformed church in Ukraine who are using their buildings to support the people moving from east to west as they seek safety and sanctuary. They are also working in the border areas of Hungary, Slovakia and Romania using the Reformed Church contacts and buildings there.

They are providing daily updates and you can see more Information here: https://reformatus.hu/english/news/emergency-response-for-ukraine/

Though RCHA you can support those fleeing from the east and coming to the west of Ukraine where they can be helped through the churches there; those in the west already who don't have access to their money when the banks run out and who will need food/help; and those who cross the borders into Hungary, Slovakia or Romania.

A Word from our Assistant Minister

The Calling to Survive and Thrive

What do you want to be when you grow up? Has anyone ever asked you this question in your childhood? Probably yes. Every time this question is asked the focus is normally on your career, not on your calling. Maybe it is

an indication that we are not giving the due importance to the Christian notion of calling nowadays.

In Christian theology, there is a special word to refer to our calling. The word is vocation and is different from career. The word vocation comes from the Latin word "vocare" which means to call. Therefore, a person who is aware of his vocation is a person who is listening to God. The root of the word career, in turn, refers us to the idea of "racetrack". As we well know, racetracks, although in different formats, are places where you do a lot of laps without going anywhere. God has called us to faithfully respond to a vocation and not merely to develop a successful career.

God has called us all on two levels. Firstly, he called us to follow Jesus. It is our primary calling. When we respond to the call to follow Jesus, we realise that God is also calling us on a second level. Secondly God calls to participate in what he is doing in the world. If you have decided to follow Jesus and take part in what God is doing, you shouldn't choose where to serve and how to serve.

I have been serving as an ordained minister in the Brazilian Presbyterian Church for almost 23 years. The last 12 years I have spent in a big and wonderful community in the Sao Paulo countryside. My family and I thought we would be there until the end of our lives, but Jesus had different plans for us.

Now we are here in Scotland because we are disciples of Jesus looking for opportunities to participate creatively in what he is doing here. We are very pleased to be here because God has put us into an amazing community formed by

lovely people. However, in many ways, it has not been easy. Outside of us, we have the challenge of the weather that is a little bit different from what we are used to in Brazil. Moreover, we have the challenge of the language. For example, the "g" sound in English is the "d" sound in Portuguese. The result? I don't know how to pronounce the word *changed*, yet.

There are challenges inside of us too. Every day we must work hard to understand how we can serve Jesus and his kingdom while we are serving Springfield Cambridge Church and the Church of Scotland. My family and I still cannot see the entire path ahead for us, but we go forward knowing it's going to be a fascinating journey because Jesus is going ahead of us.

Do not think that only people serving as ministers, elders or missionaries are called by God to serve him and his kingdom. Actually, the word confession and the word profession have the same Latin root. It means that a disciple of Jesus embraces his profession not only to survive, but also to confess Jesus through whom he or she thrives.

The Dutch theologian Abraham Kuyper once said. "There is not a square inch in the whole domain of our human existence over which Christ, who is Sovereign over all, does not cry, Mine!" Our world is a 'big parish' in which we live, serve, and pray all the time. "Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven." Kuyper's words invite us to think deeply about what we are praying for.

PRESBYTERY PLANNING Mission Plan Review Update

Mission Plan Latest

The Presbytery Plan Creation Group has now started work on how Glasgow can best meet the requirements of the Presbytery Mission Plan Act. Glasgow has been allocated 84 ministries by the General Assembly and the Group is looking at how to best make use of these posts.

Over the coming months the Group will be using newsletters and social media channels to keep you up to date as they work towards producing a draft plan to go to Presbytery later this year. Since our last magazine in December 2021, Presbytery has issued the following two updates:

31 January 2022

Dear Friends

"To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven"

What is our purpose to be in these times? That is the question which the Presbytery Plan Creation Group is now dealing with.

I think this is a time to face facts, to pull up and to plant, to build on what has been done and to continue that work urgently.

Time to face facts: The 2021 General Assembly instructed all presbyteries to review and update their mission plans by the end of 2022.

Time to pull-up and plant: The Presbytery of Glasgow has been allocated a total of 84 'ministry' posts. We currently have 123 charges, and many church buildings

Time to complete work already begun: The Presbytery Mission Plan Review Group and last year's local focus groups have given us 21 principles to abide by. Now, we all have work to do: The PPCG has to bring a draft Mission Plan before Presbytery for approval by September and the Faith Nurture Forum and General Trustees by December.

It is important to us that we consult with local churches and take their comments and concerns into consideration. We are a diverse Presbytery; we are coming from different starting places and our congregations each have their own characters and histories. There will be change. Change both excites and threatens us and I can relate to both reactions. We face hard choices. No parish or post is 'immune'. As in bereavement, when we feel

shock, numbness, anxiety or denial, we react with denial, defensively, even angrily. After all, we are experiencing loss shared, personal and cultural.

However, I do wonder where will defensiveness lead? Denial might deliver a short-term payoff; a committee given a bloody nose; a hard choice left for another day; the illusion of business as usual. We could split into parties 'for and against' or argue over the inheritance. All very understandable and very human, but is there another way?

What if we own these feelings? What if we say, "Yes, I do feel threatened. We are angry and resentful" and go on to say, "Alright, we won't pretend that this is what we'd choose normally, but we have to deal with it. This is the time." This cannot be wished away. Much has already been done and now we have to see it through.

Your PPCG will work conscientiously to bring a draft plan before Presbytery. Then Presbytery will decide.

Over the coming weeks and months we will make every effort to maintain regular contact with you. It is important that you know how we are progressing and it is equally important to us that we know about your comments and concerns. What can you offer in this shared effort?

Dear Friends,

You may recall that last December Presbytery agreed that the work on the new Mission Plan would be done on a zonal basis. Presbytery will be asked to approve these zones on 8th March, so we are contacting you now to ask each congregation to confirm where it sees itself best placed. Once these zones are agreed, the Presbytery Plan Creation Group (PPCG) will consult with each zone and at a local level to work out how best the plan will be met.

Congregations have been placed in the same geographical grouping that was given for the focus groups last autumn. It might be that you feel your congregation sits better in an alternative group. If so please make clear in your response where it would be better placed and why.

In order that this work can be placed before Presbytery on 8th March, the PPCG asks for responses to be returned by 28th February.

The provisional map is based on geography and there may be some congregations who feel that they would be better working with those in another zone. Once the zones are agreed, an allocation of posts will then be given to each zone for the further discussions. The population figures used to make these allocations will be the most recently available to presbytery, which takes its guidance from the Church of Scotland statistician. Given that the plan will be reviewed on an annual basis, it is anticipated that each year the populations in each zone will be revised and the plan updated on that basis.



COVID 19 financial impact at a glance

Review of 2021

The principal source of income for Springfield Cambridge Church comes from Weekly Offerings, but due to COVID only 41 "normal Sunday Services" with "full congregations" were possible in 2021. Continuous emphasis is placed on "Tax Efficient Giving" for those members whose circumstances allow and it is pleasing to note that 87p in each £1 of offerings received in 2021 was Gift-Aided compared with pre-pandemic, 80p per £1 in 2019. The number of members giving "Tax Efficiently as at 31st December 2021 was 186 as against 202 at the 1st January 2021. There are also another 7 members who regularly give Tax Efficiently to any appeals that take place during the year depending on their own tax situation. As a congregation we continue to take maximum advantage where possible of the Gift Aid Small Donation Scheme (GASDS) that was first introduced on 6th April 2013 which means that we can claim tax relief on the first £8,000 of small cash donations in the offering plate, but due to the impact of COVID the tax relief received in tax year 2021/22 is considerably lower than we would normally receive.

As well as Income from Offerings we also received a generous donation in 2021 from the 65th Glasgow Girls' Brigade Company towards the Heating System/Boiler Appeal. In 2021 we also received £15,343 (2020-£10,645) in donations/contributions from the outside agencies who regularly use our halls. We maintain an excellent relationship with all the outside agencies who use our premises and the Trustees recognise the positive financial benefits this brings to Springfield Cambridge Church. There is a minimal cost to the church apart from heating and lighting for the Outside Agencies as most of the "opening/closing" of the Church Buildings is carried out by volunteer members.

In 2021 £80,085 was spent on the installation of a new boiler and state of the art heating system with another £7,879 spent on Fabric Repairs to the buildings. We are indebted to Fabric Committee and the Monday morning work party who do so much to maintain the church buildings.

The General Fund in 2021 shows a deficit for the year of £2,550. £538 has been transferred to the Manse Fund as at the year-end and £8,000 transferred from the Fabric Fund to the General Fund which means that the General Fund shows a balance of £5,467 as at 31st December 2021.

As at 31st December 2021 we were still awaiting settlement of our Quarter 4 (2021) General Fund tax claim from HMRC for £5,940. Payment of this amount was received on 19th January 2022.

Unfortunately, no credit interest was payable on our bank accounts during 2021 due to continuing low interest rates and this is also likely to be the case in the near future.

Review of 2021 (contd)

We are members of The Church of Scotland Energy Scheme for Electricity and Gas which is administered by the General Trustees. Nearly 900 Church of Scotland congregations are members of the scheme and Springfield Cambridge has been a member since the group was formed nearly 20 years ago. The Trustees are committed to lowering energy costs in the medium to long term and the Congregational Board has an ongoing action plan that is being implanted at the moment that will help to achieve this goal. We also received a 100% exemption from water charges in tax year 2021/2022 and this will continue in tax year 2022/2023. This exemption is granted on the basis of our income in previous years

Many Challenges lie ahead in 2022 and beyond with the impact of COVID 19 still being felt financially by the congregation and by many of our members who have adversely affected. The generosity of many members to Springfield Cambridge in 2021 was quite staggering taking everything into consideration and we as the Trustees are most grateful for each financial contribution that was made by members last year.
