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A Word from our Minister: Love and grace sought

Presbytery Planning is occupying much of my attention and focus just now as The Presbytery of Glasgow seeks to reduce the number of ministry posts as instructed by the General Assembly. In our area, Zone 3, the reduction will amount to a move from 22 to 10.5 posts. Each Zone is forming clusters of congregations who will work together to agree the required reductions. During May and June our Kirk Session will have numerous meetings with Cadder and Kenmure Churches and a Facilitator appointed by Presbytery to help our cluster of Cadder, Kenmure and Springfield Cambridge work through this process. Currently Kenmure is without a Minister and has not been granted permission to call, and so we have to devise a plan for the next five years of how best we can provide ministry to our 3 congregations and parishes with 2 Ministers. Naturally this is creating a sense of anxiety and concern for many.

A while ago I went to the cinema to see the film **Belfast** set in Northern Ireland in 1969. Buddy a nine year old Protestant boy has a crush on a Roman Catholic classmate. He asks his father if he could have a future with her, and his father replies, "That wee girl can be a practicing Hindu, or Southern Baptist, or vegetarian Anti-Christ. But if she's kind, and fair, and you two respect each other, she and her people are welcome in her house."

Love and grace win the day, if not the war. This father's ethos of welcome strikes me as deeply Christian. I like to think that such qualities will be found in the midst of this Presbytery planning process. Of course I have been around the Kirk long enough, and seen previous iterations of Presbytery plans to know that this is not always the case. But, for my part, I am trying to remind myself of the need to let love and grace win the day. They are like guard rails of our faith.

In *Belfast*, the father doesn't simply say that everyone is welcome. He says they are welcome if they are kind and fair and respect others. That's a big if. Isn't the whole point of grace that Christ's love extends to those who are neither kind, nor fair, nor respectful? I need something apart from my own goodness to be the basis for my welcome in Christ's Church?

And so it goes on. We will always wrestle with these questions, because we will always encounter and love people in Presbytery planning, in life in general who don't fit into our boxes. But then I recall that the heart of Christianity is never what we do; it is what God does. The community of God's people doesn't spring from our activity; it comes from God. As long as we err on the side of love and stay open to the Holy Spirit's guidance, we follow the commandment Jesus gave the community formed in his name: to love one another, so people will know we are his disciples. May it be so for me and for you.

A Word from our Assistant Minister

Friendship and Discipleship

Brazilian writer Joao Guimaraes Rosa has a magnificent phrase: "the real is not in the exit or in the arrival, it is ready for us is in the middle of the crossing." In my interpretation, he is warning us that life is a crossing between birth and death and between genesis and apocalypse. This is nothing new for anyone who has stopped to reflect, for even a minute, on the meaning of life. What is not always clear to most people is the fact that life is a kind of crossing that we cannot do alone. When God thought of our life, our crossing, he supposed that we were going to do it in the company of friends.

Jesus himself did not want to make his crossing alone. Anyone who looks at the two thousand years of Christianity, at the great organisations that have grown up around it, at the millions of people who profess the Christian faith, at all the good and bad things that are associated with it, finds it difficult to believe that it all started with a simple friendship invitation. The purpose of discipleship revealed by Mark may be disappointing, but Jesus called 12 men "to be with Him" (Mark 3:14), to be His friends.

That's why the disciples had trouble understanding Jesus' intentions. They thought that Jesus had an ace up his sleeve that would be placed on the table at the right time. It was unacceptable that someone who cured the blind and the paralysed, raised the dead, multiplied loaves, and therefore seemed so powerful, did not have a sophisticated project of conquering power. It was unthinkable to accept the fact that it was all just a pilgrimage of friends, but it was.

After teaching this very important first lesson, Jesus sent them out to preach. Doing this he was saying: whatever you do, do it as a result of the friendship you have with me, which leads us to conclude that discipleship and Christian mission are a repercussion of our friendship with Jesus. Otherwise, it isn't discipleship or Christian mission at all.

Then notice that we can't live the Christian life without cultivating friendship with Jesus and the special people that God has been putting in our journey of life. I think Brazilian singer and poet Renato Russo help us to understand why friendship is so important in life. He has a song that says: "with you around, I liked myself better." There are people who make us like ourselves more and like God more. They are our friends. We are supposed to do our crossing alongside them.

If you think it is hard to make friends you might be right, but if we consider friendship as something essential to our progress in discipleship and that God provides all we need to become faithful apprentices of Jesus, we can have a new perspective. Friendship is a gift from God. We don't make friends; we find friends which God has been giving to us.



Ask God to help you find your journey friends and celebrate life with them while you are on the crossing. The reason for that is simple: in life, between a good beginning and a good ending or a bad beginning and a good ending, there is always deep friendship. No one can finish the journey of life well without the companionship and support of friends.

As I write this note to you, I have a companion with me today, toothache! Don't you just love toothache? I went to the dentist yesterday, and as I sat in the waiting room alongside another patient, I longed to hear my name being called. And so when the dentist called the other patient first my heart sank. I'd never been so desperate to get into that dentist's chair as I did yesterday, but I had to wait.

The waiting place, described so well by the children's author Dr Seuss.

"The waiting place, for people just waiting. Waiting for a train to go or a bus to come, Or a plane to go, or the mail to come or the rain to go, Or the phone to ring or the snow to snow. Or waiting for a yes or no, or waiting for hair to grow, Everyone is just waiting'.

I have just submitted my final assignment to Trinity College, Glasgow University, just finished my final placement in training to become a Church of Scotland Minister and I now find myself in the waiting place. Waiting to come to you at Springfield Cambridge Parish Church to begin the next step of my journey, a step I am so looking forward to. We are all waiting for something, but we so often struggle to wait. I wonder how we can wait well. Isaiah reminds us that, those who wait upon God get fresh strength; they spread their wings and soar like eagles.

Isn't that a wonderful image, from our waiting with God we are refreshed and rise with hope? There is power in waiting as well, it's perhaps one of the best of the best life balancing, soul strengthening, decision making gifts God gives us. But perhaps the fear of what the waiting place may hold can rob us of the delicious rest, hope and change it can offer. For as Isaiah tells, it is from our waiting with God that our deepest longings appear.

I spent several years wondering about my sense of call to ministry and wandering through life as I tried to understand it and perhaps reason it away. I guess I was waiting for a miraculous sign or for the timing to feel just right, ironically it was when Ross and I waited on the arrival of our miracle, the birth of our son Benjamin that I felt now was the time. I realised for me answering God's call was about taking the decisive step and acting in faithful response from the context in which I found myself. Freeing myself to be compliant to God's will. And to be honest if it wasn't God's will and timing there is no way I could have juggled life, motherhood, study, and placements over the past four years.

Yesterday, in that dentist's waiting room, what helped me wait well was knowing that my name would be called. Today, as I wait to be with you at Springfield Cambridge and as my family wait to see where God is calling us, we wait well, in hope, knowing our name will be called.

God speaks into each of our lives, Be Still and know that I am God.

Wait well and I will see you all very soon.

Presbytery Planning Update

In May 2002 Rev. Val Duff, a Facilitator from the Presbytery of Glasgow will meet with the Kirk Session of Kenmure Church(11/5), Cadder Church(16/5) and Springfield Cambridge(17/5) and then in June 2022 with the combined Kirk Sessions at Kenmure (8/6), Cadder(13/6) and Springfield Cambridge(20/6) to discuss how we will minister to Bishopbriggs with fewer ministries than we have enjoyed in the past to help fulfill the General Assembly's requirement for a new Presbytery Plan. As details emerge of these significant changes, we will keep you advised.

Weekly Freewill Offering (WFO) Envelopes

Many members will be familiar with the habit of filling their weekly Church envelopes with their offering and bringing them to Church on a Sunday morning. Some members who use them will be tax payers and may have Gift Aided their offerings and others may be non tax payers and so we have two different colours of envelopes in use to differentiate for Gift Aid Tax claim purposes.



Usually at this time of the year we are preparing to reorder these envelopes which cost the Church about £500 each year to supply to those who have requested them. We have been reviewing their usage over the past two years and have noticed that the number of envelopes being returned is very considerably less than those being supplied to our members.

Those who currently receive WFO envelopes but currently **DO NOT** use them regularly will be contacted shortly by David Lockhart or Joyce Macmillan by letter to ask if they wish to continue with envelopes.

For some people changed financial circumstances may mean that they no longer need them. For others an inability to physically get to Church may mean that their use is less and it is not always possible to pass them to someone to bring them to Church. Some members may have moved to paying directly via their bank or building society during recent Covid times.

In any event please let David or Joyce know your preference. Should you have any questions or queries they will be happy to help you as will our Treasurer, Jim Kerr.

COVID UPDATE



The Kirk Session met on 17/05/22 and considered the latest changes introduced by the Scottish Government and advised by our central Church offices at 121 George Street in Edinburgh.

For the foreseeable future the following measures will apply:

- Hand sanitiser should be used on entry to and exit from the building;
- Face coverings may be worn by those who wish;
- Track and trace details will no longer be required;
- Worshippers will no longer be shown to their pews;
- Worshippers may choose to sit anywhere in the two main central sections of the Church without the need to socially distance ;
- Worshippers who would prefer to maintain 1 metre social distancing should sit comfortably in the left and right side aisle seating areas;
- The Offering will continue to be received upon entry into the Hall of Fellowship to minimise the risk of those handling the Offering Plates and counting their contents
- Holy Communion elements will be individual elements collected by those participating in Communion to the minimise risk through the passing of elements and those assisting with the distribution will observe good hygiene practices.
- Worshippers will exit the Church via the Chancel Fire Escape Doors.

Treasurer's Report

This being the final magazine of the session I would just like to take the opportunity to wish everyone a very pleasant summer. Hopefully by the time you read this article some long hot and sunny days will have arrived!

Thanks to all the regular "givers" for your offerings. Whether you give by weekly envelopes or bankers order, your contributions are much appreciated and mean that we can meet our regular ongoing expenses. Even over the summer months our average outgoings will still be nearly \pounds 12,000 per month without taking into account any one-off expenditure items that may crop up.

The General Fund has a Deficit for the year of £4,447 as at 15^{th} May 2022. We expect to receive a settlement shortly of the Quarter 1 2022 General Fund tax claim from HMRC for approximately £4,750. All Income and Outgoings for 2022 to date are broadly in line with the budget set out at the beginning of the year.

I am pleased to advise that as a Congregation we have again been granted full exemption from paying any water charges for the tax year 2022/2023. Any Registered Charity whose annual income is less than \pounds 200,000 can apply for exemption under the scheme introduced by the Scottish Government.

We have also recently received much appreciated donations from the following: £600 donation from The Guild to the Fabric Fund £450 donation from the Badminton Club to the General Fund

The Church and Manse Insurance has recently been renewed at an annual premium of $\pounds 3,323$.
