A Word from our Minister: Pilgrim Way

At the end of last month I took the train from Glasgow to Birmingham to visit Beth and attend a concert with her in the splendid Symphony Hall. Before the 'gig' there was a short VIP sound check and a 'meet and greet' with the performer KT Tunstall. A fellow Glaswegian asked her about the impact of growing up in Scotland and what her early musical influences were, as she now lives in the U.S.A. Someone else asked her about her favourite places to play music. She told us of an occasion when she was supporting Hall and Oates at Madison Square Gardens, N.Y., in front of 20,000 people when all her equipment failed due to an elctrical fault with the exception of her microphone. Reflecting on that experience and what it had taught her, she said, and I paraphrase here, "I have come to realise that memorable is preferable to perfection. I would rather someone came to one of my gigs and found it to be memorable rather than musically perfect as a performer." Another 'super fan' whom she clearly knew asked her, "what else is left on your bucket list?" given our Scottish singer's long career so far?

That set me thinking on my return train journey the next day of my own 'bucket list'. For a long time I have had a hankering to go on a pilgrimage. Not any pilgrimage, but the pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela, the traditional site of the apostle James' final resting place via the Camino de Santiago, "The Way of St. James." Pilgrimage is as old as religion and perhaps demonstrates the human spirit's longing for a journey of discovery. In his upcoming book "From Plague to Purpose", Joshua Taylor writes, "The pilgrimage discipline, at its heart, is an intentional journey to a liminal experience of unknowing, discomfort, and reorientation for the individual pilgrim." Only time will tell if I ever manage to cross this particular milestone off my 'bucket list.' However as I journey through the season of Lent I am trying to picture myself on a daily pilgrimage towards Jerusalem as we approach the Easter

season. To look for and find signs of grace in my daily routine in and around Bishopbriggs. To gain a new understanding of a famous quote of Frederick Buechner, "Listen to your life. See it for the fathomless mystery it is. In the boredom and pain of it, no less than in the excitement and gladness: touch, taste, smell your way to the holy and hidden heart of it, because in the last anaylsis all moments are key moments, and life itself is grace." After all life is seldom about perfection, and what remains with us are those memorable moments which endure in our bodies, minds, and souls.

Those moments may well be found in Birmingham, Bishopbriggs or Santiago de Compostela. Pilgrims are welcome to join wherever, whenever they can on the Pilgrim Way. Why not step outside of yourself this Lent and encounter God anew?

The poet David Whyte sums up this aptly in his poem:

For the road to Santiago

For the road to Santiago don't make new declarations about what to bring and what to leave behind.

Bring what you have.

You were always going that way anyway, you were always going there all along.

A Word from our Assistant Minister: Gratitude

Let's imagine a hypothetical exercise in two steps: the first step would be to assume that tomorrow you wake up and start complaining about everything and everyone. Imagine that you started every conversation with a complaint, whether it was about a bad night's sleep, about the bad administration of the country, about the low wages of retirees, a complaint about violence, about the non-recognition by people of the effort that you made. The idea would be to assume the posture of complaining about everything.

The day after tomorrow, on the second step, you would do something different. You would start the day with gratitude. Gratitude to God for being alive, for being healthy, gratitude for the day, for the house, for the family, gratitude for true friendships, for work, for the husband, for the wife, gratitude for the church and for faith in Christ. The idea would be to assume a posture of gratitude.

Which of the two postures do you think would awaken the most pleasant feelings in you? Which of the two postures would make you feel closer to God and bring lightness to your life? Surely the posture of gratitude because the human being was created with capacity to be grateful. The Hebrew word for gratitude can be translated as acknowledging the good. If we are able to acknowledge the good we have received, gratitude flows naturally.

There is a very close relationship between gratitude and blessing. While gratitude means acknowledging good, the word blessing means projecting or injecting good into another. I am finishing my time here at Springfield Cambridge Church. On Sunday the 23rd of April I will be with you for an official farewell. You have been blessing my family and myself in a way that can't be expressed in words. However, if I had to choose only one word to sum up my experience working with you, it would be 'obrigado.'

The following article, relating to the 268 Boys' Brigade appeared in The Link - which is the newsletter of the Glasgow Steadfast Association.

268th Glasgow - A Company made for Camping.

Most Boys' Brigade companies are registered for an orderly start to a new session. However, the 268th Glasgow attached to the then Springfield Church Bishopbriggs was a little different. During the winter of 1934/35 an embryonic Youth Club had been meeting in the local tennis club in Southview Terrace. The boys and staff had until recently been members of the 182nd Glasgow attached to Kenmure Church nearby. However due to differences of opinion some staff left and that resulted in a group of boys also leaving.

The men involved agreed that they had to provide something for the boys to do over those winter months (no TV, no electronic games in those days) and so the youth club was born. It was decided that a summer camp would be a good idea and so plans were hatched. However, finding a farmer willing to provide a field to a youth club was proving a challenge. Therefore, the men approached Springfield Church and put forward the idea of starting a BB Company there. The idea was met positively by the Kirk Session and so in May 1935 the 268th Glasgow came into being - initially for the purposes of going to camp that summer.

To say that the newly appointed Captain John Davie was persuasive is an understatement. He managed to convince his new wife Mary that her honeymoon should be to BB camp! How many new grooms could get away with that?

And so, the newly enrolled 268 headed to camp in summer 1935 to Millport, a site they returned to for a number of years.

Not only were these early camps successful but they also made their way into print.



By 1947 with the War over there was an appetite to try out new pastures and so the camp went to the far east - well, Arbroath. A venue to which the company returned off and on for almost 40 years.



Those of you who know Arbroath may be able to identify the spot that this picture was taken.

By the 1950s camps were held in Montrose, both at Abbey Bank and Hillside together with North Berwick and Filey, a first venture south of the border.

In addition to these camps the Company was keen to send a representation to the Founders Camp in 1954 and so William Forrest and David Wilson were dispatched to the playing fields of Eton. David Wilson may be known to some as the longtime owner of The Peat Inn in Fife and also a judge in early episodes of MasterChef.





During one of the camps in the 1950s there was a local talent show and the Company entered a singing group of boys - needless to say all were surprised when The Riversiders came back to camp victorious. The name coming from the signature tune, "Down by the Riverside".

The Riversiders have made occasional appearances at Company events over the years.

During the 1960s camping continued to be a cornerstone of the BB year culminating in a trip over the water to Portrush in 1969 just as "The Troubles" were becoming a political issue. Photographic memories of this period are difficult to come by as most of the camp records were on cine film which has not been digitized.

The 1970s saw the company venturing abroad for the first time to Bredene in Belgium utilizing hostel style accommodation which is still operating.



During the 1970s company numbers increased and camp numbers reflected this. Venues included Tynemouth with two returns to Elliot Junction, Arbroath, together with Oban where some of our boys, the MacDougall triplets were entertained to afternoon tea by Lady McDougall of McDougall on whose ground we were camping.



Arbroath 1977 represents the Company's largest camp to date with 92 boys plus staff. Catering and logistics for the fortnight were not so much a challenge as a nightmare. Shopping was a twice daily event.

As the 1980s dawned our trips south switch from east to west coast visiting Heysham, Keswick, St Anne's, Seahouses, yes that one on the east coast, and Morecambe together with Nairn and that old favourite, Arbroath. Some 268 boys also attended the International Camp at Ayr in 1986 celebrating the Centenary of camping in the BB including a sail to Tighnabruach to visit Auchenlochan.

The 1990s saw regular visits to Hexham to Broomley Grange, a BB house with adjacent fields for outdoor camping together with return trips to Keswick. The

Company also visited Aviemore, and the Company were also involved in the International Camp in Aberdeen in 1991.



As the 90s ended and we passed the Millennium, camp was changing with more use of indoor accommodation. Visiting London and Amsterdam and the week camp often becoming a weekend event and now less frequent than that historical annual jaunt.

At our ex-members events, Camp tales often feature in the chat and the craic. As the old song says, "Memories are made of this".

And so not only was the 268 made for Camping but it can also be said that Camping was the making of the 268.




