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A Word from our Minister: A weight (wait) of expectations

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of foolishness, it was the eopoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of light, it was the season of darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair." (Charles Dickens: A Tale of Two Cities)

That famous quote came to mind as I was reflecting upon the times in which we are living. With a coronation having just taken place, we are now living in the Carolean era - during the reign of King Charles. Or for those of us in the Church of Scotland, we might say we are living in the times of Presbytery Mission Planning! In these curent times, where do you find yourself - in the best of times, or the worst of times? And what are our expectations in the midst of those times? Are we hopeful or are we in the winter of despair.

Expecations can be confusing. We can apply them to ourselves (I will write my magazine article two weeks before the copy date). Or they can be imposed on us by others (the Magazine Editor will only print materials submitted by the due date!) As I listened to what Julie said at our Service on 07/05/23 about the weight of the crown (5 bags of sugar or 10lbs) placed upon King Charles it made me think more about expectations. The new King had waited a long time - a lifetime effectively to bear the weight of that crown on his head. As that weight settled upon him, it bore many expectations - his own, those of his family and friends, those of his subjects and members of the Commonwealth, and those of his opponents. What a weight.

When I first met the King he was only a Prince, and my impression of him was that he was a man just like me. I found him to be warm, humorous, trying to do his best. And yet he is unlike me - he lives in a Royal household, I live in a Manse. However from our conversations I know that he has in his own life known the best of times and the worst of times. Just like you and me, I suppose. But my overwhelming sense

was that he was trying to do the best, to be the best version of himself, for himself, and for others. I am reminded that in Colossians 3:20 we read, "Whatever you are doing put your whole heart into it." Isn't that what we are all called to do - to offer the best of ourselves in the service of others. In that way we glorify God, the one who calls us into his royal household as his beloved children.

"One for sorrow, two for joy, three for a girl, four for a boy, five for silver, six for gold, seven for a secret never to be told" The well-known nursery rhyme, where the number of Magpies seen at any one time supposedly determines whether you have good luck or bad luck. Well, I have two in my garden, currently destroying my grass, nothing joyful about that? Bad luck, or so I thought! Hominem unius libri timeo, meaning "Beware the man of a single book".

In 1958, the communist Chinese government declared war on the nation's sparrows, for they were eating up all the country's precious seed grain. A massive campaign was launched to keep the birds constantly in flight and die of exhaustion. In the fields and cities drums were ceaselessly pounded, pots and pans were beaten,

fireworks set off and before too long the little birds began to fall from the sky in great numbers. China was victorious in its war and soon the numbers of these birds reached extinction. Treasurer's Report

This being the final magazine of the session I would just like to take the opportunity to wish everyone a very pleasant summer. Hopefully by the time you read this article some long hot and sunny days will have arrived!

Thanks to all the regular "givers" for your offerings. Whether you give by weekly envelopes or bankers order, your contributions are much appreciated and mean that we can meet our regular ongoing expenses. Even over the summer months our average outgoings will still be nearly £10,000 per month without taking into account any one-off expenditure items that may crop up.

The General Fund has a Deficit for the year of £5,353 as at 15th May 2023. We expect to receive settlement shortly of the Quarter 1 2023 General Fund tax claim from HMRC along with settlement of a small amount outstanding from 2022. All Income and Outgoings for 2023 to date are broadly in line with the budget set out as the beginning of the year.

I am pleased to advise that as a Congregation we have again been granted full exemption from paying any water charges for the tax year 2023/2024. Any Registered Charity whose annual income is less than £200,000 can apply for exemption under the scheme introduced by the Scottish Government.

We have also recently received much appreciated donations from the following: -

£500 donation from the Badminton Club to the General Fund

The Church and Manse Insurance has recently been renewed at an annual premium of £3,680.
