A Word from our Minister:

Chain reactions

At the meeting of the Presbytery of Glasgow on 12/09/23, my nomination as the Business Committee Convener was confirmed. The reaction to this news has been fascinating to me. But before I turn to that, let me explain what this new role will involve for me. Currently the Business Committee is responsible for:

- ordering the business of Presbytery;
- giving space for Committees and Teams to understand what each other is working on and whether there is potential overlap or potential for working collaboratively on a matter;
- arranging away days for Conveners and Vice-Conveners to consider together issues that affect Presbytery as a whole;
- exercising oversight of Presbytery finance, working with the Treasurer to prepare the annual budget, and;
- preparing and approving Presbytery's annual accounts.

For me, this will mean a few extra meetings each month and a more regular attendance at all meetings of Presbytery. But back to reactions to this new role. When I shared this news with some of our office-bearers the news was received with mixed emotions. Some were concerned for my workload. Others were more pragmatic. I explained that all Ministers at their Ordination/Induction are required to sign a Formula accepting their obligations as Ministers, having previously publicly taken a number of vows, one of which is to promise: "to be subject in the Lord to this Presbytery and to the General Assembly of this Church, and to take your due part in the administration of its affairs." So in accepting this new role, I am fulfilling a vow I took a long number of years ago. But I have also accepted this position as the Presbytery believes I have something to offer and contribute to its work at this time. What this does do for me and our congregation is ensure that I will not be asked to serve as an Interim Moderator, which in the current climate would be a more onerous and lengthier task. Another individual asked Julie, if this meant I would be given a pay rise, and have some of my other duties and responsibilities delegated to someone else! The answer to those questions is of course NO. A colleague on the day of the meeting, sent me a text to congratulate me, and another member of Presbytery greeted me on my arrival and asked how I felt about my 'peerage'. Then finally after Presbytery had

approved my appointment a colleague tapped me on my shoulder, congratulated me and shook my hand.

At this point, as ever, I thought to myself, "What have I let myself in for?" Time alone will tell, but I shall be relying on your prayers and support as I take up these new and additional responsibilities.

Assistant Minister

Having satisfactorily completed her 15 month probationary placement with us on 31/10/23, Mrs Julie Hearty, has from 01/11/23 extended her time with us, in the first instance for a period of 6 months. During this time she will work with our Church Monday-Wednesday and on a Sunday. On Thursdays she will work with '121' and their Training Team supporting students and in particular Probationers currently on placement. During this period Julie will still be able to look for a charge of her own resulting in her Ordination, but this gives her a degree of security in these uncertain times because of the Mission Planning process the Kirk is engaged in.

ADVENT: WAITING FOR PEACE

When Mary was told that she would bear the Son of God, and he would be called the "Wonderful Counsellor, Prince of Peace." I cannot begin to imagine what thoughts filled her mind and what emotions stirred in her heart. As you read this article, hopefully on its publication on the first Sunday of Advent, my heart, like yours I am sure will have been greatly troubled by the scenes of the unfolding violence in Israel/Palestine and Gaza city in particular. If ever there was a need for peace, it would seem to be now. So how shall we wait for the return of the Prince of Peace in this season?

In November, 1943, Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote a letter from his prison cell at Tegel, during a time of war:

"Celebrating Advent means being able to wait.
Waiting is an art that our impatient age has forgotten.

Those who do not know how it feels to anxiously struggle with the deepest questions of life, of their life, and to patiently look forward with anticipation until the truth is revealed, cannot even dream of the splendour of the moment in which clarity is illuminated for them.

And for those who do want to win the friendship and love of another person - who do not expectantly open up their soul to the soul of the other person, until friendship and love come, until they make their entrance - for such people the deepest blessing of the one life of two intertwined souls will remain forever hidden.

Whoever does not know the austere blessedness of waiting that is, of hopefully doing without will never experience the full blessing of fulfilment.

For the greatest, most profound, tenderest things in the world, we must wait.

It happens here not in a storm but according to the divine laws of sprouting, growing and becoming.

Night, put out whatever is burning; grant me total forgetfulness; be charitable to me.



Night, do your gentle work; in you I put my trust.
But the night is wise and mighty, wiser than I and mightier than the day.

What no earthly power can do - where thoughts and feelings, defiance and tears must fail - that is what night pours over me in rich abundance.

We are silent in the early hours of each day, because God is supposed to have the first word, and we are silent before going to sleep, because to God belongs the last word.

We are silent solely for the sake of the word, not in order to show dishonour to the word but in order to honour and receive it properly.

Silence ultimately means nothing but waiting for God's word and coming away blessed by God's word.

Life in a prison cell may be compared to Advent: one waits, hopes, and does this, that, or the other - things that are really of no consequence - the door is shut, and can only be opened from the outside."

Come Prince of Peace, come to a broken world in need of healing, justice, mercy and peace from the outside in.

A Word from our Assistant Minister:

"Mum, can I get a pet for Christmas?"

I nervously ask, "What pet would you like?"

"A goldfish"

"Let's write a letter to Santa", was my relieved reply!

The countdown to Christmas has officially begun in my house, "not yet Benjamin".

Likewise, for me, following successful completion of my 15-month probationary placement, the countdown to Ordination has begun, "not yet Julie".

Waiting is good for us, remember that this December when the queues in M&S are giving you heartburn! Many of God's good blessings come on the heels of waiting. We must all sit with the words, "not yet" but we are in good company for God's people have always had to wait.

Think about Abraham and Sarah, God's promise to Abraham that his wife would bear a son and that he would be the father of many nations wasn't fulfilled until Abraham was 100 years old and his wife was over 90. Or what of the people of God in Egypt? They were slaves for centuries before God raised up a deliverer, and even once they were delivered God made them wander in the wilderness for 40 years before entering the Promised Land. Finally, imagine the deafening silence that set in at the end of the book of Malachi. After an excruciating rollercoaster ride through the Old Testament, its 460 years before we finally hear the amazing words in Luke 3:2, "The word of God came to John, son of Zechariah in the wilderness". No prophet had spoken to the people for nearly 5 centuries when Jesus Christ finally arrives on the scene.

Waiting was built into the blessing. It gave the people time to prepare, time to grow in trust and time for their hearts to be emptied of other things to make room for the coming gift.

God was not to be caricatured as a giant Santa Claus bestowing gifts upon people the moment they asked for them or wanted them. If the people of God were to truly grasp some of the big-ness of what God was doing in their day, waiting was God's way.

Advent is a gift, for it is the Christian's way of making room for the important piece of life that the world is so eager to get rid of, waiting.

So, this Advent, 5-year-old Benjamin is teaching me how to live in "not yet" as I wait to be inducted and ordained into my first charge, as I wait to wear a clerical collar and be named Reverend Julie Hearty. In the meantime, I wait in the assurance that I am a beloved child of God, and I am blessed to wait with you all at Springfield Cambridge Parish Church.

Together this advent we wait. We wait for God to fulfil his promise again. In this liminal time, we ask God to enlarge our hearts and allow us to comprehend the tremendous gift that He has given us in Jesus. Waiting is good for us, let us prepare. Let us be ready for the sweetness that has come and that is coming again.

Lodging House Mission Christmas Cards

The team would like to thank everyone who purchased Christmas cards this year and for any donations made. The total of £800 was raised and handed into the LHM who were extremely grateful.

Treasurer's Report

Thank you once again to all the regular "givers" for all their offerings over the last few months. All contributions are much appreciated whether it is by standing order, cheque, PayPal or offering plate on a Sunday morning.

Our financial situation has been boosted recently with much needed Outside Agencies Income which now totals approx. £2,000 per month.

We are expecting settlement shortly of our Quarter 1 and Quarter 2 General Fund tax claims for 2023 totalling £9,200 in respect of Gift Aid offerings with other tax claims due to be repaid by the year end.

We paid our final Giving to Grow payment for 2023 of £6,972 to the Church of Scotland on the 15th November 2023. We have also received notice from Church of Scotland that the amount due in 2024 from Springfield Cambridge Church for the "Giving to Grow" scheme is £71,093. This amount is payable in 10 instalments from February to November and equates to £7,109.30 per month.

At present we have a deficit on the General Fund for the year to date of £14,803 although this situation should improve over the next few weeks towards year end in line with the budgeted figures at the start of the year.

If you know you will be later away after the service, perhaps because you like a good natter over a cup of tea, please consider parking next to the back wall of the car park, otherwise use rows 1 to 4 as indicated above. Park in row 1 first bonnet pointing towards the park as indicated by the arrows, then row 2 etc. Please do not park in rows 2 or 4 unless there is a car in front of you in the other row. Some additional parking is available next to the grass in front of row 1. If parking here, please park lengthways pointing back out of the car park per arrows.
